



Letter from the Head

Like many areas of the public sector, you will be aware that teachers are dissatisfied with the pay award that has been granted this year. There was no financial recognition for what teachers went through to support our young people during the pandemic last year and this increase, like that of many others, falls way

below inflation. The two largest teaching unions, the NASUWT and the NEU, are balloting their members to judge whether there is an appetite to strike or take action short of striking. The ballots close in early to mid-January and, if the decision is to strike, we can reasonably expect that action to be taken within 6 months of the vote. Unusually, even the Association of College and School Lecturers (ASCL), a union whose members are predominately those who make up the senior leadership of schools and Multi Academy Trusts, are consulting on whether to ballot for strike action too.

Initial communication from the NASUWT and NEU is that if the results of their preliminary ballots were repeated in the formal ballot, they would meet the government's legal criteria for a national strike, which requires at least 50% of a union's total membership to vote in favour.

According to a report by Income Data Research, for the NEU, teachers' starting pay in England remains behind that of graduates by 8.2%. Graduate pay of those not in teaching is still significantly higher at three and five years into their careers than teachers at the equivalent point. Whilst no one goes into teaching to get rich, the profession will only be able to attract excellent graduates if terms and conditions for employment remain competitive. The DfE reports that there has been a 20% drop in the number of graduates signing up for teacher training this year and that they have only attracted 59% of their target number of



people to secondary school teacher training; this target that has been missed for 9 of the last 10 years.

At Dame Alice Owen's, the wider funding crisis is hitting us as hard as any other school and we are waiting to hear how the 2.3 billion pounds promised to education filters down to us specifically. The Worshipful Company of Brewers contributes significantly to the school but core education funding is not within their remit, they also have significantly less money, post Covid, to distribute to the school; we are having to cut our cloth accordingly in a number of areas.

So, what are we doing about this?

Dame Alice Owen's continues to work with a wide range of universities and institutions in order to help train and attract the highest quality teachers for our young people, though it proving difficult to recruit at every level. We also work with a number of organisations such as the Confederation of Schools' Trust and the ASCL who represent our views to the government and work with decision makers to try and bring about positive resolutions to difficult problems. We are also speaking to our MP, the Rt Hon Oliver Dowden, and are delighted that he will be coming into school at the end of January to speak to us more fully about a number of challenges we currently face at Owen's and in education, not least appropriate pay and adequate funding.

We hope that appropriate steps and changes will be taken and made which mean that the unions do not feel that striking is the only option left for them but we will be sure to keep the school community updated as this unfolds.

Whilst all of this is going on in the background, I am proud to say that our staff have been working as hard as ever to ensure that our young people still have access to as many of the teaching and wider opportunities we have always striven to give them as possible. In the pages that follow you will be able to read reports of sporting and public speaking success, of concerts, drama productions and a plethora of visits, home and abroad which have been taking place to educate, inspire and extend our students. It remains a privilege to be part of this wonderful community and heartwarming to see that *The Times* has, **once again placed Dame Alice Owen's as the top performing comprehensive school in the country**.

I would like to thank the staff, teaching and support, for their incredible work this term, for their dedication to providing the very best outcomes and opportunities that they can for our young people and to wish you all a merry Christmas and a bright New Year.






CHESS CLUB NEWS

A LEVEL LIFE DRAWING SESSION



On Friday, 18th November, Years 12 and 13 A Level Art students attended a life drawing workshop. The morning consisted of a succession of drawing a model in different poses starting with quick, 3-minute charcoal sketches and worked up to a half an hour detailed drawing.



We were given plenty of individual tips on perspective, including how to improve proportions and technique. Some of us had never had an experience like this before. I found that this was so much better than drawing from a photograph: the 3D shape was easier to draw as well as being more enjoyable compared to drawing from the flat surface of a photograph.

We have also been given the opportunity to go to regular life drawing classes in the future, which is something I look forward to pursuing.

After the workshop concluded, we were given the chance to go to a gallery and take photographs in London; I decided to go to the V&A. I really enjoyed my experience of going to a life drawing class and will apply the techniques I learned to my artwork and portfolio, as well as recommend the experience to others.'

'Biology in Action' Lecture Day



We were all captivated and astonished by Tim Underwood's research into oesophageal cancer and enjoyed asking questions about his experiences as a surgeon.



All in all, it was a truly inspirational day that showcased the breadth of biology in the real world and explored the future of research.

On a wet, windy November night, Anish Shah (Yr13), his parents and I attended the celebration event for students that participated in the Nuffield research placements programme over the summer holiday. The Nuffield programme provides engaging, hands-on research projects, where students have the opportunity to make a meaningful contribution towards the work of a host organisation through well-supervised but independent research.


The celebration was held at Imperial College, London, and there were wonderful speakers including a keynote from Dr Jackie Bell (definitely one to watch - I suspect we may see her in space!). The students explained their research projects and wider learning to the assembled academics, families and other guests.

Anish worked at LifeArc, a medical research charity, doing the type of research into antibiotic resistance in bacteria that you would expect to see from third year university students. His project has been presented as both a report and a scientific poster and we are hopeful that it will be published. We are incredibly proud of what Anish has achieved and know that the experience will stand him in good stead for the future!

The breadth of research by the students was astonishing, from the impact of the Covid-19 lockdowns on adolescent mental health to how we may protect corals for the future. There were projects from science, quantitative social science, computing, technology, engineering and maths (and combinations of these!).

Some of the lunchtime lectures included the following topics: 'A Smart, Sustainable London: TfL's Vision for the Future of the World's Greatest City', 'A career in Dentistry: What you need to know', 'Motor Neurone Disease' and 'Can artificial intelligence be creative?'

Many thanks to all our guests who came in to deliver a Lunchtime Lecture and inspire us!

I went to see the 'Career pathway in Engineering with Emma Knowles' lecture and I thought it was great because I got a real grasp on what the concept of engineering was, and she talked about her experience working as a chemical engineer, which was helpful to me especially as that's the discipline that I'm most interested in studying at university.

I also thought it was really good to see just how broad the engineering sector is, as you can choose whatever field is most interesting to you, whether that's working with aircraft or pharmaceuticals and it was inspiring to hear from someone who demonstrated what a fulfilling career a chemical engineer can have. She talked about her day-to-day life as a chemical engineer, but emphasised the fact that she uses transferable skills from all disciplines. I love chemistry, physics and maths so I really enjoyed this lecture and towards the end she even discussed possible engineering internships and degree apprenticeships that were available at her current company which I'll look forward to applying for in the future.

NEWS FROM THE DRAMA DEPARTMENT

There are things that you only experience if you are a Drama teacher; for example, on leaving my house on Saturday morning to do some errands I saw that something was stuck to the bottom of my trainer...a stick-on moustache!

This I believe is the sign of being the director of a production: it follows you everywhere, morning, noon and night, the soundtrack playing in your dreams until the last night.

As we draw into the last week of term and reflect on all we have achieved it has been pretty impressive; Year 11 and 13 performing Devised Exams in November followed by the Winter Show.





Since September Year 11 have been working hard to produce their Devised Pieces exploring a range of topics that demonstrated their maturity and creativity. All the groups excelled in their individual pieces, using a range of theatre practitioners such as frantic assembly, verbatim and Brecht. Beginning with the stimulus of a Doll's House they went in all sorts of different directions including: PTSD after a terrorist attack: the different forms of domestic abuse including coercive control; the way in which parenting styles effect a child's outcomes and the reality of romantic relationships.

The pieces were well received by our audience of parents and friends in the evening in our Drama Studio and there was lots of positive feedback.

Year 13 were inspired by their stimulus playtext 'Anna Karenina' and the theatre practitioner style of Shared Experience; creating a clever exploration of the role of female writers through different decades. The piece opened with Flora as a female playwright struggling with writer's block which only increased as each of the characters in her play rebelled against the way they were written.

The group's chosen practitioner style enabled Annalisa, Edie, Isla and Hollie to both act and dance, the latter being a way of expressing their characters' inner thoughts and emotions. I believe they enjoyed choreographing the Tango the most; a clever interpretation of reversing a woman's role in 19th century writing through its twist at the end.



Greta created beautiful costume designs for the piece which enabled the actors to move between the different decades. Her designs, along with the content of the piece was well received by our audience of parents and friends.



My adaptation of 'Much Ado About Nothing' began in the Summer Holidays of 2022, inspired by my Year 11 students talking about the Shakespeare plays they liked the most. Daisy declared that 'Much Ado About Nothing' was her favourite and as I thought about the potential actors in Years 10 – 13 I thought that actually this would be a perfect choice.

By September I'd written at least two drafts and we began rehearsals in earnest, including lunchtimes for the dancing choreographed by Lottie. As our brilliant choreographers in Year 11 really didn't have the time to both act and dance due to their preparation for January mocks, the students in the Year 8 Drama Club were invited to join the cast and became our fantastic dance troupe.



The set was designed and painted by Mr Anastasi, Lottie and Zoe recreating an image of Messina in the early 1960s in order to establish the play's location in sunny Sicily.

Stage and Technical crew were led by Oliver who did a fantastic job of organising all of the rigging and set up of the sound, lighting and properties. He gave a really thoughtful speech on the last night ensuring that every single member of his team got a mention including the technical leads; James on lighting, Alex on sound and Hannah as stage manager.

The dancing was also choreographed by Lottie and she also managed the properties, ably assisted by her sister Izzy whom Miss Khan noted as always being expertly laid out for every performance on the props table.

Although a show is almost three months of rehearsals, all of these take place after school and on Sundays compared with a professional production where you rehearse all day, which is why it never ceases to amaze me what we finally produce onstage. It looks effortless, yet that is because we have all worked so hard to make it appear like that. And of course, no one knows about the page jumps, the mayhem when someone forgets to come on or the loss of an important prop, but that's what makes up all those hilarious stories that the cast love retelling years later.

This was a perfect cast, a group of students from a wide range of ages and at different stages in their learning as performers, however the thing that united them was that they all love being on stage.

Anyone who gets involved in the Drama Productions will build a group of lifelong friends and allies who are always there to support one another and cheer them on. Many members of staff have praised individual performances, however in my head everyone has played an important role in *Much Ado About Nothing* from the Year 8 dancers up to our fantastic romantic leads; Anjali & Rotimi (Beatrice & Benedict), Sam P & Daisy (Claudio & Hero).





Our American marines, led brilliantly by Sami as Commander Castillo became more and more like the cast of *Top Gun* as the nights went on with their sunglasses and swagger. Their teasing of Benedict felt like you were watching a testosterone-fuelled movie scene providing the audience with the perfect contrast to Hero and her friends. Sam P was particularly adept at playing the jealous Claudio who was quick to accuse his fiancé of cheating on him and Jed played the villain John with real Machiavellian pride. His followers Tiana and Sam C developed their revenge seeking roles into the indignant and hilarious prisoners of the watch. Meanwhile in the girls' boudoir, Anjali, Daisy, Kat, Katya and Frances' exchanges questioned the double standards of the 1960s with sparkling wit as they argued amongst themselves as to how to navigate the changing narrative surrounding love and marriage.

The audience really loved the interaction between Lottie, Aron, Andrew and Toby who played the leads as the Messina Marina Police force.

Together with 'the watch' played by the ensemble, they pretty much stole the show whenever they came on. A particularly ridiculous moment being when they were sharing what looked like an entire roll of toilet roll as they sobbed along to Toby's rendition of 'Time to Say Goodbye.'



The play is a comedy but it also has great moments of tension in the second half which were beautifully played by Annalisa, Edie, Daisy and Phoebe as they reacted to the deception set up by John. A special mention most goes out to Anjali and Rotimi: their work on stage was truly mature, their duologue never ceased to make me cry; a master class in naturalistic acting.

For some of our students it may well be their last performance after seven years of performances at Owen's.

I would like to thank Annalisa, Edie, Ben and Patrick for taking part in so many of our performances. Finally, I would like to thank Miss Khan and Mr Henshaw who have assisted at rehearsals and backstage on the three nights – I really appreciate your time and efforts. I'm sure that you will enjoy the delicious cakes hand-baked by Sam C and enjoy your well-earned Christmas break.



Year 10 Somme and Ypres Trip

It put into perspective just how many lives were lost, and seeing the hundreds of thousands of names at some of the biggest cemeteries, such as Notre Dame de Lorette and Tyne Cot, was an opportunity to reflect on the history we have learnt and to see it eternalised in front of us. We were able to see just how far the reach of these wars spread as we found the names of old Owenians in the cemeteries and memorials, some of whom we can see on our school memorial every day.



The memories of this trip will forever be a reminder of the bravery and resilience of the soldiers, not only in WW1 but in every war. This includes the current conflict we constantly see in the news and although the context may differ, it is unfortunate how many connections we can make between now and then.

This was a very emotional trip as we reflected on the tragedy of the past, but coming together in remembrance allowed everyone to support each other during the emotional journey. I think we speak for everyone when we say it was a trip we will never forget.

We are very grateful to have had such a knowledgeable and enthusiastic guide throughout the trip who answered all of our questions, giving us an amazing, educational experience.

'Maths in Action' Lecture Day

On Thursday, 24th November, about 20 Further Maths students attended a 'Maths in Action' lecture day at the Emmanuel Centre in Westminster. It consisted of an array of fascinating lectures on different sub-topics.

Year 9 Autumn Term Maths Masterclasses

Starting from the 1st of October 2022, the Royal Institution of Mathematics had been running 5 maths masterclasses at the University of Hertfordshire every 2 weeks. Every other Saturday, there was a class lasting 2 hours and 30 minutes on a different branch of mathematics. New visitors came in each time and gave lectures on the field of maths that relates to their jobs and how it made their jobs more interesting.

Over the course of the 5 masterclasses, we had a chance to look at 5 fascinating parts of mathematics. In the first lesson, we looked at permutations and the way different things can be arranged. In the second lesson, we learnt about probabilities and the odds of daily occurrences in real life. In the third lesson, we learnt about quantum physics and how maths applies to that. In particular, we focused on the quantum coin, using circle facts and trigonometry. In the fourth lesson, we learnt about fractals, which are shapes that have a non-integer dimension and can reach zero area but infinite perimeter. They're extremely interesting! Finally, in the fifth and final lesson, we learnt about patterns and puzzles.

The classes were absolutely amazing as they allowed to explore new ways of learning through group activities, practical work and engaging challenges – all this encouraging one to think outside the textbook. Besides, these masterclasses showed how to solve problems quickly and effectively and to feel more confident participating in discussions. In other words, we were not only introduced to some of the most enjoyable aspects of mathematics, but also acquired a wide range of skills to apply in everyday life.

The maths masterclasses turned out to be a great fun enjoyed by everyone with a passion for maths! I would definitely recommend these classes to future Year 9 students, so that they too could unlock a whole new world of mathematics.



Well done to them all!




