The student-led jAmnesty gig, which took place just before half term, was another roaring success with this, together with other fundraising initiatives, raising over £1,300 for Amnesty International. Congratulations go to all of our performers as well as to Miranda Gibbons and Alice Wood who organised the whole event and to Wesley Wilson and the entire Tech crew for a fabulous afternoon of music.

We were able to commemorate Remembrance Day on the 11th of the 11th this year and once again were able to learn a little more about some of our alumni who made the ultimate sacrifice during the wars.

Some of our Year 8 computing wizards enjoyed their time at the Amazon Boot camp, which offered training and advice that will help them build an app to be entered in Amazon's competition later this academic year.

We were all treated to another fascinating evening, run by Mrs Wilson and our Year 13 students who have prepared for their Extended Project Qualification (EPQ). For this qualification – worth the equivalent of half an A Level – students must research a topic, prepare an extended essay to demonstrate their findings along with a presentation that must describe what they have learnt about the organisation skills needed to complete such a task. Students this year spoke on a wide range of subjects from 'To what extent does corruption inhibit economic growth?' to 'To what extent did the cinematic landscape of 1965-75 accurately represent the zeitgeist of the time?' via 'Advancements in Cancer treatment: Is there a new viable treatment option, through the use of oHSV, that could replace chemotherapy and radiotherapy in the future?'. The evening was as informative and stimulating as ever; the students presented with gravitas and confidence and we hope that their meticulous preparation is reflected in their final grades in the summer.



The winter term has also brought us the Gym and Dance show which seems to improve in quality each year. An explosion of movement flew from the trampette and over the box whilst other groups told wonderful stories through their dance and movement. Thanks go to Miss Martin, Ms Lord, the PE Department and our student choreographers as well as to our fantastic performers for two wonderful shows.

Staying with sport, special congratulations go to Oliver Almond in Year 10 who recently won Bronze at the Under 18 British Judo Championships and to Alexandra Lockett who retained her title of Under 14 National Longbow Champion and came second in the National Junior Longbow competition (open age).

Our talented musicians have kept us entertained this half term with a concert a week. From the large scale orchestras, ensembles and choirs to the smaller chamber groups, the standard of music produced also seems to improve year on year. Thank you to Ms Bamber, Ms Jenkins, Mr Grimstead, Mrs Jones as well as to all of the Principal Consultants and visiting music teachers who all work so hard to help our students reach such heights.

This year's winter production was another real treat with students presenting Ms Govier's original script, Sherlock Holmes & the Strange Case of the Circassian Dagger. The acting was superb and the comic timing was faultless leading to a magnificent evening of feel-good entertainment. The Tech crew brought further professionalism and atmosphere to the stage and at the end of the run we were sorry to say goodbye to Wesley Wilson as he stands down from his position as Director of Tech Crew to focus on his A Levels. We cannot thank Wesley enough for all he has done for the school over these years helping with or running the tech for our big events as well as for the more mundane day to day needs of the school. Wesley will be succeeded by Harry Liddamore and we wish him all the best in his new role.

At Owen's, the Christmas season does not officially begin until our Nine Lessons and Carols Service, which took place on Monday 16th December at St Mary The Virgin and All Saints church, Potters Bar. We were treated to a wide array of beautiful brass and vocal music which always sounds fantastic in the church. Matthew Mayes's

original carol was a noticeable highlight. Thanks go to Mrs Coles who arranged this whole event and to the OSA who provided mulled wine and mince pies to finish off the evening with even more festive cheer.

The school was delighted to receive a cheque from the OSA for £37,000 which will go to pay for a range of facilities for your children that we would not otherwise be able to afford including kitting out a new gym, replacing our old minibus, providing resources for lunchtime clubs and societies and subsidising some of the online resources our teachers and students rely on so heavily. We cannot thank the OSA enough for all that they do to support the school and we thank all those parents who have participated in events or helped out where they could for their support too. The aims of the school's house system are:

- Promote student leadership through the House Captain and House Prefect system
- Utilise and expand traditional house competitions across all curriculum and extra curricular areas

During lessons and as part of daily school life, students earn points individually which are tallied for their own house. These house points are now incorporated into the new school commendation rewards system.

French A-Level students enjoy a film study day

On Friday 22nd of November, 20 Year 12 and Year 13 French students travelled to the British Film Institute on London's Southbank for a French Study day.

During the morning we were given a whistle-stop tour of some of the most important films in French cinema, developing a greater understanding of concepts like 'auteur' cinema and the very influential 'Nouvelle Vague' movement of the 1960s.

We also learned more about how techniques such as different camera angles and use of sound subtly affect the viewers understanding of the film.

In the afternoon there was a rare treat – an opportunity to watch La Haine (Hate) - the film we study in Year 12 – as it was intended: on a big screen with proper sound. This in itself was a mind-blowing experience for students, many of whom came away from the experience with a much greater understanding of the



film... and lots more questions! Many thanks to Mrs Gillingham for organising this excellent outing.

Year 12 and 13 German pupils visit Southbank's BFI

Mr Robinson organised for our Year 12 and Year 13 German students to spend Thursday 12th December at the BFI on London's Southbank for a German film study day.

In the morning, our students gained an overview of German film from the silent movie era through to the propaganda films of the Nazi regime all the way to contemporary films dealing with Germany's more recent

past.



The session was delivered mainly in German by a lecturer from a London university who engaged students in considering about how sound, camera work and editing are used as powerful techniques in filmmaking.

After lunch our students enjoyed the viewing of Goodbye, Lenin and took part in a discussion about the film. It was a valuable experience enriching our students understanding of German film as well as learning about a more analytical approach to studying film at A-Level.

Year 13 pupils take study trip to Stratford-upon-Avon

Rosie Sheehy making her debut as the lead character. The performance and direction were innovative and gripping – the exploration of the pursuit of power and its consequences felt very relevant in the modern world.

We also visited places of historic interest and saw the courting stool where the young Will Shakespeare is believed to have wooed his older bride. An excellent weekend and huge thanks to Mr Simpson for driving the minibus, writing sonnets and tweeting the actors to commend their performances.

The dramatization was engaging with students enjoying the comical yet accurate portrayal of Dickens' characters.

The Maths Department took students on two educational visits this half term.


On 26th November, 25 Year 12 Further Mathematicians went to the Emmanuel Centre in central London for a Maths in Action day.

Their Maths in Action day at the Emmanuel Centre on the 29th November featured talks and demonstrations on a range of topics including the challenge of measuring space, the movement of crowds and code breaking (by mathematician James Grime pictured right).

THE PSYCHOLOGY DEPARTMENT

Year 12 pupils review Dr Guy Sutton's Brain Day lecture

Three Psychology students share their thoughts on Dr Guy Sutton's annual Brain Day lecture, which took place at the school on 5th November. An expert in neuroscience and genetics, Dr Sutton discussed the biology of the human brain and how it works, including contemporary research on a range of issues, such as the effects of drugs, illness and trauma on the brain, all of which are related to the A-Level Psychology course that the pupils are studying.

Review 1: "Before going to the lecture, I thought there was no way I would be engaged for three hours but Guy managed to capture the whole room's attention. Guy's knowledge was very impressive and his enthusiasm for his work really helped his delivery. Particularly interesting topics included the effects of 9/11 and PTSD, the criminal mind, effect of child abuse, are they to blame?, methods of treating epilepsy (living with half a brain). I would highly recommend it to the school's younger years and I look forward to attending the Year 13 lecture day."



Review 2: "Everything I learned was delivered so well. Guy was engaging and very passionate. The brain dissection was amazing. Without its meninges, the brain was quite soft and the meninges, which surrounds it, is very tough. We learned so much about how the formation of the brain can go wrong, for example cyclops syndrome (failure of two eyes to develop in an embryo), holoprosencephaly (where the forebrain of a foetus doesn't develop into two hemispheres) and anencephaly (the absence of a major part of the brain). Guy also



told us about the most amazing recent developments in neuroscience, that of organoids and whether if they could develop into brain tissue with primitive eyes should they be considered to be alive and the ethical implications this has."

Review 3: "I was sceptical beforehand due to the length of the talk but it was so interesting to learn about long-term effects of childhood experiences and how psychology fits in with other fields. The brain dissection was actually very helpful in understanding the different parts of the brain, holding it and seeing the hippocampus (concerned with memory) which is what we will be studying. Guy spoke with passion about different conditions from a 7-year-old bilingual girl who was born with half a brain to a man with a brain tumour which made him turn abusive. This made us think whether people are actually responsible for their actions or whether they are governed by their brain. The good old nature vs nurture debate."

Chamber Concert showcases Owen's musical talent

A busy half term for Owen's musicians kicked off in November with a showcase of the work from some of our Chamber groups, as well as some GCSE Music students' solos.

For some, it was their first time on stage in a DAOS concert, others were sharing with us the experience of many years. The Guitar Ensemble, directed by Joe Niesyto, set the evening off to a toetapping start with La Cumparsita, followed by a soulful rendition of Leonard Cohen's



Hallelujah. This ensemble includes students from all years and they demonstrated how they continue to go from strength to strength!

The evening featured two of the school's string quartets:

The Year 8 String Quartet gave a very assured and communicative performance of the second movement of Beethoven's Quartet in C minor op.18, no. 4, while the Year 11 (and 10) Quartet stunned the audience with their performance of the first two movements of Shostakovich's electrifying String Quartet no. 8. Written to express the composer's deep despair, either at seeing the destruction of Dresden after WW2, or at being forced to join the Communist Party (depending which version you believe), this performance left the audience pinned to their seats for quite some seconds while the final notes resounded around the hall.

We were also delighted to be treated to some wonderful solo performances: Gabriella Bavetta's deeply moving rendition of Wagner's Romance for Violin and Piano, Kayla Nicol's dramatic performance of Eugene Ysaye's demonic Sonata no.2 for Solo Violin, Isaac Scheer's commanding and also singing performance of Concertino for Trombone by Ferdinand David in which he was very ably accompanied on the piano by classmate, Josh Gearing, and, finally, a delightfully light-touched and dancing rendition of Gershwin's piano version of *I Got* Rhythm from Katya Kirby.

Debussy's elegant Ballet from Petite Suite was given a warm and suitably dance-like rendition by the Advanced Flute Ensemble conducted, on this occasion, by Katrina Makepeace-Lott.

In the final item of the evening, we saw a group of very experienced Owen's musicians come together for the first time in this combination, in the unique line-up needed to perform the first movement of Schubert's magnificent Octet: Eleanor Davis and Jeremy Weinstein on violins, Jemima Atputharatnam on viola, Matthew Mayes on cello, Doraly Gill on double bass, Joe Loveday on clarinet, Jess Brady on French horn and Dora Goudie on bassoon gave us a rare opportunity to hear this piece performed live, with its richness of sonority, ingenuity of ensemble and high demand on all performers. Their breathtaking performance swept us all along in a very fitting finale to a fabulous evening of music that was enormously enjoyed by a highly appreciative audience.

Our thanks go to James Widden, Joe Niesyto, Janna Hunneke, and Katrina Makepeace-Lott for their direction, tuition and accompanying.

Owen's choirs hit the high notes at Choral Concert

More than 300 voices resounded around the Edward Guinness Hall in the remarkable and joyous finale to our November Choral Concert, as all five Owen's choirs, along with audience participation, joined together to sing *Something Inside So Strong*.

This was a fitting culmination to an evening in which Owen's singers had kept the audience entranced and delighted, from start to end. The choirs, from Years 7 to 13, presented a programme of music so varied that there was, for everyone, something comfortingly familiar as well as something new to discover, from jazz standards, to traditional songs, songs from musicals, Abba favourites to Rachmaninov's *Vespers* and much more.

To add even more colour to the evening, not only was there the expert piano accompaniment of Mr Thompson, Ms Gill and Year 12 student, Jonny Rugg, but also a variety of other beautifully played instrumental accompaniment: guitar (Mr Grimstead),

Junior Ensemble and orchestras set festive mood

With the strike of a solo drum, the DAOS Junior Ensemble opened the Orchestral Concert on 3rd December playing a 450-year-old piece, *Danserye*, with the confidence and aplomb that marked out all of their performance. This is a new ensemble and it was exciting to see many musicians take to the stage for the first time, some having taken up their instruments only weeks earlier. Their conductor, Ms Dominique Jones, was clearly enormously proud of her musicians' fabulous achievement!



Junior Ensemble

The evening continued to showcase the school's orchestras: the Chamber Orchestra, Junior Chamber Strings, Senior Strings, Second Orchestra and the Symphony Orchestra. The audience was treated to a wide range of styles, moods and emotions, ranging from Felix Mendelssohn's joyous *Italian Symphony* and the eastern European dance rhythms of Antonin Dvorak's *Slavonic Dance no.8*, to Richard Strauss' pained despair at mankind's ability to destroy all that is good in technology-assisted warfare: the Senior Strings' performance of *Metamorphosen*, conducted by Mr James Widden, captured the deeply emotional gravity of this music.



Chamber Orchestra

The enormous **Second Orchestra**, conducted by Mrs Jo Brady, filled every corner of the EGH stage with their personnel and every corner of the hall with their rich sound. They certainly lifted the mood with their joyous performing of a programme that included *The Avengers* and some seasonal fare in a Christmas Festival.

Owen's student conductors were also in impressive form: in the first half, Year 10s Josh Gearing and Katherine Vincent made highly assured debuts at the helm of the **Junior Chamber Strings** in music by Johann Sebastien Bach and Edvard Grieg to great acclaim.

In the second half, the **Symphony Orchestra**, conducted by Ms Katherine Bamber, gave us a journey through

The theme of the night sky ended the concert as, with the sound of Santa's bells, Leroy Anderson's *Sleigh Ride* sent us all off in a festive mood.

Congratulations to Owen's music competitions winners



CROSS COUNTRY

English Schools Cross Country Cup National Final

Following an excellent victory at the regional finals in November, our wonderful U16 girls' cross country team qualified for the National finals, which took place at Mount St Mary's College, Sheffield on Saturday 7th December. This is the fifth time in six years that we have qualified for a National Cup Final, and the team were determined to achieve their highest place finish yet.

In what was a very challenging course, the team put together a fantastic effort to finish 4th overall – this is an incredible achievement when you consider that



over 800 schools enter the competition at the start of the season. Aimi Weightman raced exceptionally well to place 4th, Niamh Keohane followed in 27th, and both Evie Wootton and Maisie O'Shea placed inside the top 50. The team was completed by Roisin Keohane and Anna Pritchard who placed in the top 70 (in a race with 168 runners). 4th in the country is an incredible achievement and we are very proud of all the girls!

District Cross Country Championships

Students from Years 7 to 13 represented the school in the District Cross Country Championships that took place at Queenswood School. There was some excellent runs across all age groups, and for the tenth year in a row, Owen's were crowned overall District champions!

NETBALL

Year 7 – Year 7 have had a fantastic start to the year in regards to attitude and success in their netball. The girls had a huge turn out to house sports and have continued to develop throughout the term. The girls played Monks Walk and won a fantastic 36-3 and both the A and B team beat Mount Grace in a shortened fixture (due to light) 8-4 and 6-3 respectively. We are looking forward to the Saturday morning netball fixtures starting next term.

Year 8 – Year 8 have had a fantastic start to the year. The A team were successful in their County Cup match against Haberdasher's and are now in the quarter final. There were performances from pupils across all age groups, demonstrating their skills in trampette, box, floor and different styles of dance. Well done to all of the pupils involved for their hard work, attending rehearsals and for two fantastic performances.

BASKETBALL

Year 9 – The Year 9 basketball team have had a successful season. They won a number of matches, scoring over 30 points on many occasions. At the District basketball rally, the boys were unlucky as the games were so short. Overall, however, it's been a good year with lots of positives. Well done to all students involved.

Year 10 – The Year 10 team have had a mixed season, coming across some of the stronger schools in the district. They also participated in the District rally, winning two out of three games.

RUGBY

Year 7 – The Year 7 rugby team have had a brilliant start to rugby at Owen's. The turnout at training has been brilliant with an excess of 30 students attending training on a weekly basis. As the boys have progressed through the season, their results and performances have improved significantly. The highlight of the year was beating a strong Roundwood Park side 6 tries to 2. If the students carry on improving they could become a very strong rugby team. With interest in the sport growing all the time, we hope to play some A and B team matches after Christmas.

Year 8 – After a successful rugby tour to Holland over half term, the Year 8 rugby team have continued to develop. Their performances at Saturday morning fixtures have been excellent, competing well against Enfield Grammar, Sir John Lawes, Roundwood Park and Haileybury. Rugby will continue for this year group after Christmas, with a number of mid-week games taking place.

Year 9 – The boys have shown some improvement in their game play and skills, following on from the tour to Holland in the half term. They continue to work well as a team and this has been demonstrated in their matches, with teachers from opposing schools commenting on the progress that the team has made.

Year 10 – The Year 10 rugby team have had a very strong season so far, with the highlight being a victory over defending champions Hemel in the County Cup. Performances on Saturday mornings have been encouraging, and the team are due to face Tring in the semi final of the County Cup after Christmas.

1st XV – The fixtures have increased for the 1st XV since the half-term break, and after a tough match against a very strong Dr Challoner's team, there was considerable improvement against Roundwood Park, which was followed by a big win over Samuel Ryder. The team are due to face Birchwood in the county trophy on Tuesday 17th December in a repeat of the quarter final from last season.

FOOTBALL

U12 girls – We have had a fantastic turnout on a weekly basis to the girls football club on a Friday lunchtime. The girls had an opportunity to put into practice everything that they had worked on in the District tournament. 11

girls went to Hertswood school and competed against several other schools in the district. The B team did exceptionally well despite only having five players, in a 6-a-side tournament, due to illness and injuries. The girls drew all of their games except one which they lost to semi-finalists Mount Grace. The A team won all their games which advanced them to the semi-finals as top of their pool.

The girls played exceptionally well beating Chancellors B team in the semi final to then face their A team in the final (who they beat in the rounds). With it being only five minutes, the girls were against the clock to score as many goals as they could, unfortunately, Chancellors managed to go 1-0 very quickly and followed that up with another goal shortly after. The girls lost the final 2-0 but played exceptionally well and were District runners up.

U14 girls – The U14 girls had their District Football tournament at Hertswood where they played other schools in the District such as Hertswood, Chancellors and Queenswood. The girls played





exceptionally well and rarely conceded a goal. However, due to the scoring system, as the girls only drew their games it meant that they did not advance to the semi finals.

U16 girls – The U16 girls had a fantastic run in the County Cup where they won both their first games 4-0 and 7-2. In the quarter finals, the girls met a really strong St Edmunds side. The girls scored early on with a fantastic goal by Maya however this was followed by a quick counter attack which meant the score was 1-1. The girls had several chances to take the lead and with a fantastic cross Hannah managed to secure the lead. The girls worked really hard during the game but unfortunately St Edmunds managed to score two more goals, one from a corner and one from an interception. The final score was 3-2.

Well done to the girls who have played exceptionally well throughout the year, a special mention to Maya who organised the team throughout.

Year 10 boys – The team have had a couple fixtures this half term where they beat Onslow but narrowly losing to Monks Walk in the District Cup. Improvements are being seen each time they play.

Year 11 boys –The team progressed into the quarter final of the County Cup after a hard fought win against Chancellors. They will be playing the next round after the Christmas break.

1st XI – The 1st XI have had another successful half term of football. They have reached the quarter final of the County Cup by beating a strong Queen's side and have won all of their district group stage games so far. More awaits the team in the new year with a district final looming and the start of the County League.

BADMINTON

There was an opportunity for our badminton players to represent the school in the District badminton tournament. Pupils in Years 7 to 10 competed against local schools in both singles and doubles matches. Owen's won all four tournaments (KS3 girls, KS3 boys, KS4 girls, KS4 boys).

OTHER SUCCESSES

Archery – In December, Alexandra Lockett competed in the Junior National Indoor Championships, retaining her title of Under 14 National Longbow Champion. She shot particularly well, despite a freezing cold archery hall and external temperatures of -3 degrees, (which particularly affects longbows), coming 2nd for all Junior Longbows nationally (regardless of age) and only missing the top slot by 24 points, (even though the winner has

been shooting for four years more than Alexandra). In her class, she achieved 150 points ahead of the second place archer.

Judo – Congratulations to Year 10 pupil, Oliver Almond (pictured right) who has won his third national judo title in four years, taking Bronze at the 2019 U18 British National Judo Championships.

Aged just 14, Oliver will compete for the next three years in this U18 ageband, so winning a medal in his first year at this level against much older competitors is a remarkable achievement.

Oliver's success at the British Championships gives him automatic selection to the England Development Squad where he has the opportunity to be selected to represent England at more advanced European events in 2020.

The PE Department would like to thank all the staff, parents and students for all your support with lifts and help at fixtures which have made it such a successful term.




NEWS FROM THE OSA
