



Letter from the Head

This half term has been a difficult one for the teaching profession with the decision as to whether to take industrial action or not, at the front of everyone's mind.

We were pleased that the school's MP, The Rt Hon Oliver Dowden, came to talk to the Chair of Governors, our Business Manager and

myself about school funding, the week before the strike. We explained the difficulties the school is currently experiencing and the concern we have that the increased energy bills, as well as the impact of the unfunded pay increase, will mean; that, if things remain unchanged, we will find it increasingly difficult to be able to continue providing the level of education and resource we have come to pride ourselves on at Owen's. The minister seemed sympathetic, although, disappointingly, he was clear that he was unable to offer any assurances of improvement.

In more positive news, we were delighted to receive a cheque of £32,000 from the OSA at the start of term. This reflects another year of their hard work, putting on excellent events such as the OSA quiz and the Summer Festival as well as organising all the second-hand uniform sales. We are truly grateful for the support we get from the OSA and from you, the parent body, who attend and donate generously to these events. With the money that we have received, we will be able to keep funding many of the lunchtime clubs that students enjoy, update some of the sports equipment and buy new musical instruments and classroom resources which we would otherwise not have been able to afford. We will be buying a kiln for creating glasswork sculptures as well as DT equipment, including a 3D scanner, which students will be able to use with a 3D printer to scan and recreate objects. Over the summer, we also hope to be able to use a sizeable amount of this donation to refurbish part of the 6th form block.



Following the success of the last Owen's Fest, the OSA have already started preparing for the next one which is expected to be bigger and better. Mark the date - Sunday, 2nd July 2023 - and see whether you'd like to be the part of the enthusiastic organisation team.

As mentioned above, in the letter from the Head, the Match Funding scheme is one of the unique fundraising opportunities that ensures a significant increase of the amount raised at an event. Schemes vary from a company to company but here's how it roughly works.

If the OSA raises £600 at a second-hand uniform sale and a parent, who has a Matched Funding scheme at their work, volunteers to help at the sale, then the OSA can claim a matching donation of £600 from the company.

It doesn't take up a lot of your time to find out whether your company offers this - usually the HR department is a good place to start – but it could make a huge difference to the funds that the OSA is able to give back to the school raise for the school. In the last 12 months, even given the challenges of holding in-person fundraising events, the OSA received over £5,000 in match funded donations from companies via parents. That is why the OSA kindly calls on your to be proactive in this area and take the following steps:

- 1. Contact your HR department to find out what they offer, including the parameters for making a claim.
- 2. Let us know what you find out! We will then keep your name on a list and every time there is an opportunity for you to help with a fundraising event, we will give you the paperwork you need to claim the matching donation from your employer.

Year 13 University applications: 6th form staff and tutors worked hard to support those Year 13 students choosing to go to university after 6th form to complete their UCAS applications by the 25 January deadline.

Year 11 work experience scheme: All Year 11 students are encouraged to spend 3-5 days during the summer holidays experiencing a workplace. Along with Sirrond Ltd, we support students to process placements they source themselves and to provide a database of employers who have experience of offering placements specifically to our students.

Career talks and events: students continue to be exposed to different careers choices and options through the PSHRE curriculum, assemblies and lunchtime sessions. Barnett Southgate College run assemblies for Year 9 and Year 10 students to highlight both the Alevel and vocational courses they offer to students post-16. 6th form students were addressed by an ex-student currently undertaking a degree apprenticeship with EY to understand more about this exciting post 18 option for those students looking to combine work and studies. Year 9 PSHRE this term included sessions on 'Jobs and Opportunities' and introduced the concepts of 'entrepreneurship and self-employment'.

National Careers, Week 6th– 10th March 2023: We have organised for 12 alumni from DAOS to talk to students about their careers paths since leaving Owens. Speakers include NHS surgeon, vet, M&S senior executive, Advanced Air Warfare Officer in the Royal Navy, stage manager for a regional theatre, NHS digital manager, brewer and manager in a financial services firm. Detailed information about the speakers and how students can sign up the various talks will be sent out after half term.

Careers Fair, 29 March 2023: We have invited a range of employers, education and apprenticeship providers from a variety of industries for our students to meet with to learn more about courses, jobs and apprenticeships. DAOS EVENTS

Holocaust Memorial Day 2023

International Holocaust Memorial Day took place on 27 January. To mark this occasion, two talks took place at our school. We were very fortunate to have two excellent guest speakers from the organisation Generation2Generation. Both speakers are the children of Holocaust survivors and they shared their own personal family story. Our students welcomed the speakers and found the talks an important, inspiring and a memorable experience.

Year 8 students were given a talk by Judith Hyman, who told the story of her mother's life in the small town of Berndorf in Austria before and after the Anschluss on 12 March 1938. Judith used anecdotes from her mother, Charlotte, and from her aunt Frieda's oral testimony. The miracle of Charlotte and Frieda and their immediate family's escape was revealed but so too were the stories of her family who were trapped in Austria and perished in the Łódź ghetto. Judith spoke about the role of bystanders and on what can happen when people hate one another.

Sixth Form students were given a talk by Gloria Silver, who told the story of the survival of her Polish born father, then just a teenager, which was an epic story of bravery, resourcefulness and good luck. Gloria included Tony's audio testimony telling how he survived, living on his wits and taking risks despite having to cope with the murders of the rest of his family and the other horrors of the Holocaust.

Library Update

The new Librarian, Dr James, and Assistant Librarian, Mrs Dorling, are delighted to welcome all members of the Owen's community back to the library!

The library is now open from 9.15-5.00 Mondays to Thursdays and from 11.30-4.30 on Fridays. Years 7-11 can visit the library to browse, borrow, renew and return books at breaktimes, lunchtimes and after school every day. Sixth formers can also use the library during their private study periods.

The Fiction Library houses a large fiction collection to encourage reading for pleasure, with something to suit every age group and every reading level. The Non-Fiction Library offers a large range of non-fiction books to support school curriculum subjects and beyond, including books for Sixth-Form wider reading. We also offer newspapers, magazines and journals and subscriptions to a variety of online databases.

The library hosts classes for reading and research lessons, supplies resources for use in the classroom, and offers the opportunity to join Book Club and book award shadowing groups. We hope to restart author visits later in the year and will soon be recruiting new student librarians!

GCSE and A-Level students' trip to Iceland

On Friday morning, 21st October, sixty Year 11, 12 and 13 students set off from school on the geography trip to Iceland. The first stop once we arrived there was the Bridge between Two Continents where we could see how the North American Plate and Eurasian plate were moving apart. We then experienced our first real smell of Iceland – the sulphur released from steam vents created a malodorous mixture of rotten eggs and fish. As our noses got used to the smell, we headed to see lava flows from volcanic eruptions of last year. Our next stop was everyone's favourite – the Blue Lagoon; relaxing in the naturally heated waters whilst having a face mask and a refreshing smoothie was exactly what was needed after the early start.

Day 2 started with a quick tour of Reykjavik and then a visit to the Geothermal Power Station where we learnt about how Iceland is able to meet most of its energy needs in one of the most sustainable ways. Afterwards we visited three different but all equally impressive waterfalls: the first we could walk behind; the second we could walk through a narrow gorge to the bottom of it, and then finally up to the top of the third one. As a result, we were all soaking wet but it was definitely worth it. Experiencing waterfalls this close helped us comprehend the immense power that these natural features possess.

We wrapped up the day by going to the coast and playing hide-and-seek behind rocks eroded by the wind. Finally, the evening in the countryside provided us with the first real opportunity to see the Northern Lights if the clouds cleared. By 10pm the clouds were still there so the teachers sent us to our rooms but then within 5 minutes the cloud that had lingered all day suddenly cleared and we could witness some of the nature's most amazing celestial spectacles. Lots of oohs and aahs followed as the coloured lights moved across the sky.

Sunday started with a trip to a black sand beach to see the basalt columns which we could clamber up. We then headed onto a glacier, attaching crampons to our boots and with ice axes on our hands we followed the guides over the ice. It was quite shocking to learn how much the glacier had receded over the past few years. Once on the glacier, there began a competition between the boys

as to who could reveal the most ridiculous outfit on the ice; the tuxedos were followed by swimwear in the freezing weather. We then visited the Lava Museum showcasing an exhibition about all the volcanoes in Iceland, particularly E15, within a few miles of which we had been for the previous 2 days.

Our accommodation that evening had two hot tubs for our use all through the night, and again the night sky



performed its magic for us with an extravaganza of even more colours and illuminating movements. Some students were lucky to enjoy the Northern Lights show from the hot tub.

Our final full day saw us head underground with hard hats on into a lava tunnel; the cave system left behind by previous flows of lava again reminded us how this island had been significantly shaped by volcanoes. Afterwards we set on the main tourist route of the Golden Circle of Geysir, Gullfoss and Thingvellir and finally back to Reykjavik before a very early start the following morning to head back home.

It was a fascinating trip with so many different sights seen in such a short space of time. What an amazing chance to experience so many wonderful natural features and to appreciate how different a sparsely populated country like Iceland is to the UK.

On behalf of the students, I would like to thank the teachers for having put much thought and care in organising this trip for us.

Alumnus Talk

On Wednesday, 1st of February, Sixth Form students were very lucky to be able to meet Amol Rajan who gave a brilliant talk about the media, politics and journalism. He described his experience as a BBC broadcast journalist. Taking us through his career timeline from his dreams of being a cricket player to becoming the editor of the Independent and now as host of BBC Radio 4's Today programme. Amol spoke passionately about the significance of journalism in holding government to account and the duty of journalists to inform, create debate and challenge fairly and respectfully. Additionally, he emphasised the need for a greater focus on balanced, ethical journalism centred on practical policy rather than polarised politics and adversarial toxicity.

Many of you will probably recognise Amol Rajan's face from his numerous documentaries or his voice from radio and podcasts; his work having spanned themes including education, social mobility, and the impact of influential figures to name a few. A couple of days before the talk, I had watched his interview with Greta Thunberg on iPlayer. I would hugely recommend it, as it raised many intriguing issues surrounding the climate debate and showed Greta in a more relaxed and open setting. Meeting Amol in person humanised a digital world of journalism that I'd only ever experienced in black and white words or through a pixelated screen.

During the talk Amol invited us to regain perspective, in a world that is sometimes overwhelming. Stating that once we recognise our own privilege, we are in a much better position to go about changing things but also the necessity of remaining realistic and sceptical. He reiterated the importance of keeping an open mind and the vastness of knowledge because 'the more we learn the less we realise we really know' - something my mum tells me all the time! So, I must say it made an instant connection with me.

Amol highlighted the different types of journalism including objective journalism that focuses on impartiality and leading with evidence to form opinions. Campaign journalism was also discussed and Amol gave examples of its impact, recounting the time an article in 2014 on the Syrian refugee crisis by the Independent was quoted in PMQs. It consequently had an impact in contributing to a legislative change, displaying the ability of journalism to inspire a real change.

We were dazzled by the personalities he had met and stories of his interviews with the likes of Bill Gates, Hillary Clinton and other leading figures on the political scene. Amol's humour, anecdotes, genuine sentiment and enthusiastic presence captivated the students. The big names were very impressive but his emphasis on connecting with the audience and his heartfelt life advice left the biggest impact on us. Amol spoke of how individuals like Novak Djokovic and Sundar Pichai (the CEO of Google) are intensely focused on their goals and how important this is in the pursuit of success. He urged us to make opportunities for ourselves, sometimes by literally standing in the way of people we admire and just introducing ourselves. Moreover, he stressed the importance of simply being kind and always trying to bring 'solutions not problems'.

After the main talk, a few of us had the opportunity to do an extra Q&A session with Amol and further discuss the conflict between technology and crumbling aspects of the world of journalism as it moves online. In addition, we heard of the terrible toxicity in social media and how online abuse remains a prevalent issue especially for public figures. He gave us insight into the world of political journalism, allowing students to consider a vast number of topics, which not only acted as



an extension to our A level politics course but gave a wider understanding of the current political landscape. I would like to thank Mr Latham and Ms Gregory for organising such a wonderful talk and Amol Rajan for inspiring all of us and leaving us hopeful that we can go and make a positive change in whatever we do.

Maths Challenge News

In November, 29 sixth formers sat the Andrew Jobbings Senior Kangaroo Maths Challenge which is the follow-on round to the Senior Maths Challenge.

Mathematical Enrichment Day at the University of Hertfordshire

On Friday, 6th of January, 15 students from Year 10 were invited to attend a Mathematical Enrichment Day at the University of Hertfordshire. They were involved in several lectures, puzzles and mathematical activities alongside pupils from other schools in Hertfordshire.

Upon arrival, students were given the opportunity to attempt a few challenging puzzles for the chance to win prizes. After a warm welcome speech from Val Pritchard of the Advanced Mathematics Support Programme, students were split into two groups to participate in workshops. In the first of these, participants were tasked with calculating the optimum height and radius of a cone to create the largest volume possible from a 20cm wide piece of card. In the second workshop, led by Matthew Scroggs, students were engaged in an experiment into coprime dependency in circular braiding; a field of study which has puzzled even the world's best mathematicians over the past decades.

After a lunch break, where students had the opportunity to attempt more math-based puzzles, they attended a gripping, hands-on lecture presented by Matthew Scroggs. This covered many topics, ranging from famous mathematical problems, such as the 'Bridges of Konigsberg', to the study of complex 3D geometry, and a brief insight into the topology of higher dimensions and their practical applications. One student said that they "thoroughly enjoyed the experience" and would "definitely recommend it to others in future years".



THE MODERN LANGUAGES DEPARTMENT

A-Level Students Visit the British Film Institute

On Wednesday, 1st February, Y12 and Y13 French students accompanied by Mrs Paine and Mrs Stallard braved the teachers' and train strikes and made their way to the British Film Institute on the Southbank for a conference on the late 1950s French New Wave cinema movement.

The movement was characterized by its rejection of traditional filmmaking conventions in favour of experimentation and a spirit of iconoclasm. New Wave filmmakers explored new approaches to editing, visual style, and narrative, as well as engagement with the social and political upheavals of the era, often making use of irony or exploring existential themes. The New Wave is often considered one of the most influential movements in the history of cinema.

The morning session focused on introducing students to the characteristics of the movement, including its themes and its revolutionary filming techniques. They watched a series of carefully selected extracts from 7 French New Wave movies and completed activities in their groups, answering presenter's questions aimed to deepen their knowledge of the filming techniques used and their impact on the audience. They also had the opportunity to compare film extracts from the very beginning of the French New Wave cinema with more recent ones. Students enjoyed a free lunch break on the sunny Southbank and came back in the afternoon for the viewing of their A-Level film *–La Haine –* "with a fresh pair of eyes".

The following Wednesday students gather to watch *Les 400 coups* (The 400 blows) by Francois Truffaut, precursor of the movement, in B14 for the 6th Form French "Ciné Club". The next film scheduled for watching is *Bande de filles* (Girlhood), a 2014 French coming-of-age drama by Céline Sciamma, critically acclaimed and considered to be the equivalent to *La Haine* from the girls of the *cité*'s point of view. Sciamma's goal with this film was to capture the stories of Black teenagers, characters she claims are generally underdeveloped in French films.

Alumnus Talk

We were delighted to welcome back former student and medical registrar at Royal London Hospital Dr Ebo Dadey. Dr Dadey delivered a lunch time lecture which provided students with a first-hand insight into life as a doctor and advice on the lengthy application and training process.

Often aspiring medics get caught up in the idea of being a doctor or other healthcare professional without truly understanding the commitment and passion these careers demand. Having the privilege of actually speaking and listening to someone in the profession was extremely valuable. Dr Dadey described some valid reasons to work in the healthcare field, such as s desire for constant progression, stability, human interaction, a wide range of opportunities and pathways, and a general interest in the field.

Dr Dadey also talked about some pros and cons of working in healthcare, without omitting that pay and work-life balance are key things to consider. It was comforting to see that being a doctor or other healthcare professional doesn't require superpowers or a dream from a young age – just hard work and dedication. Speaking to other students, Dr Dadey's talk felt like an insight into the future. Seeing an ex-Owenian who has achieved a medical degree has helped this feel more attainable to current Owen's students. Perhaps in 15 years we'll be the ones coming back to school to inspire the next generation!

Obtaining medical work experience recently is notoriously difficult and Covid is still being a barrier to many opportunities. Dr Dadey's talk is a great example of something students can now talk about in future interviews which shows interest and curiosity for the subject.
