THE HISTORY DEPARTMENT

Year 7 pupils explore the historic city of Rochester

On the 14th and 15th May, the History department organised two one-day trips to the historic city of Rochester in Kent.

Students were given a chance to explore the second oldest cathedral in Britain and its Norman roots before climbing the tallest keep in Britain at Rochester Castle and hearing the gruesome story of the 1215 siege.

Year 7 historians were also given a workshop at the Guildhall museum that brought to life the origins and development of the city from Romans to Saxons to Normans. Students even had the opportunity to dress up in armour from each of these eras.



Finally, the groups were invited to explore the medieval high street in the glorious spring sunshine including a visit to the historic fudge shop! Teachers and locals were both hugely impressed with the enthusiasm and politeness of all our students.

In April around 300 Year 7s and Year 8s sat the Junior Maths Challenge. We are looking forward to their results.

The follow-on rounds for the Intermediate Challenge took place on 21st March with 41 students from Year 9, Year 10 and Year 11 invited to take part in the multiple choice Kangaroo Challenges and 11 of these were awarded a Merit.

Three students were invited to do the Intermediate Maths Olympiad written papers.

Based on his performance on the IMO paper, Spencer Robertson (Year 11) has been invited to attend a Summer Maths School.

Daniel Goodlad (Year 9) received a distinction on the IMO – he scored 9 or 10 out of 10 on 5 out of the 6 questions. An impressive achievement!

Year 12 textiles students recently took part in the Wool4school competition, which is a national design competition for sixth form textiles students aimed at promoting wool as a textile fibre.


Students were challenged to design an outfit that incorporated technology for a particular purpose for the wearer.

NEWS FROM THE PE DEPARTMENT

CRICKET

Year 7 – The Year 7 team have played two games – winning one and losing one. They lost in the County Cup against a strong Haileybury side but managed to beat Lochinver. Some of the team played their first cricket match and showed a lot of promised. They still have five games left to play and should improve as the season progresses.

Year 8 – The Year 8 team have played two games so far. They narrowly lost their first match against Lochinver. Callum Lloyd and Max Bhowmik produced a devastating opening spell of bowling reducing the opposition to 12 for 5. Unfortunately the boys' could not knock off the runs. Against Aldenham, the side won convincingly, keeping the opposition to 83 with good spells from Kai Adams and Irya Patel. The boys knocked the runs off in the 14th over with a quick fire 31 from Jack Matthews leading the way. The side will play Monks Walk in the first round of the County Cup.

Year 9 – Our Year 9s have progressed to the County Cup quarter finals, with the next match to be played against St Edmunds. In the previous round against St Georges, the boys' narrowly won on Duckworth Lewis after Euan Connelly produced two quick wickets before the rain stopped the game, leaving the team in a winning position by seven runs. The Year 9 cricket team will be aiming for success in the County Cup competition this season.

Year 10 – The Year 10 side have reached the County Cup quarter finals after an emphatic win against Sir John Lawes. The boys will be looking to repeat their achievements of the last two years by making a third consecutive County Cup final.



1st XI – The 1st XI got off to winning start this season with a narrow victory against a strong Enfield Grammar side. The team scored a handy 126 in their 20 overs. The mainstay of the innings was Owain Boffey who played superbly well to score 51 runs. In return, Enfield Grammar started well and looked like they would chase the total with ease. This all changed when Dylan Gunasekera came onto bowl. He finished with figures of 3-24

from his allocated overs. This changed the game and meant that Enfield Grammar finished on 119.

ATHLETICS

Athletics training in Lanzarote – During the Easter holiday six staff and 44 students travelled to sunny Club La Santa in Lanzarote. The trip was used to improve the level of athletics at school by training on both field and track events. Students took part in daily training sessions in the morning and the evening, and during the day students had the opportunity to develop other sporting skills by playing golf, volleyball, tennis, basketball, football and many more. Students also went go-karting in which Miss Martin became the new Lewis Hamilton driving the quickest lap of all those involved!

The last day involved a pentathlon where each student competed in the 100m, high jump, long jump, shot put and 800m. Students were in teams and competed for points in each event, with Mrs Gamester's team being the eventual winners. The trip was a huge success with the recent after-school training sessions seeing more than 60 students attend.

Track and Field – The U16 girls made a fantastic start at the Track and Field Cup where they have to compete in one field event and one track event each. The girls did exceptionally well, leading at the halfway point. The girls finished third after all the events with exceptional performances by Roisin, Aimi, Erin (in her new event Hammer) and Maisie. We are hoping that the girls win the next round. Well done!

Both Junior Boys and Girls and the Inter Boys will be competing on 17th May. We wish you all the best.

County League – Both boys and girls team have started strong in the Hertfordshire County League. Both U16 Boys and Girls are leading in the league table with big performance in several rounds. The U14's are improving week by week, with the U14 girls scoring a massive 57 points in the last match. Pupils are relishing the competitive environment and are improving each competition.

SWIMMING

The London Regional Championships took place at the London Aquatics Centre over three days. Alice Bayley raced every day, in seven events, spending 28 hours poolside.

She got two significant personal bests and her first ever regional medals, in 50m breaststroke – Bronze (she is now ranked 14th in Britain) and 100m breaststroke – Silver. These times get her to the English Nationals with a strong chance of British for the 50m. What a fantastic achievement!

GOLF

We were delighted that some of our students took part in the Herts Mid Handicap Golf Tournament last week. All of our golfers played very well and all finished in the top half of a field of 60 players: Maisie O'Shea – 35 points (18th); Harry Dewberry – 33 points (29th), Brendan Brunton – 34 points (23rd) and Tom Ranger – 37 points (12th).

During the Easter holidays, we had around 20 students of different ages and abilities taking part in the Golf Scholarship Programme at Old Fold Manor. Boys and girls attended six coaching sessions with the club's professionals and had great fun taking part in games and lessons designed to give them an introduction into the sport.
