The short half term does not mean that we are any less busy but rather we find ourselves moving at quite a pace to fit everything in.

After a busy half term break with students extending their learning in Granada, Berlin and through visiting Auschwitz Birkenau concentration camp in Krakow, we returned

to a magnificent set of Gym and Dance shows, the likes of which have not been seen since COVID. French and German language exchanges, theatre visits, Maths Fests, Careers week, sporting and musical competitions, concerts and a Gold Duke of Edinburgh Expedition are just a few of the opportunities your young people were able to benefit from through school this half term. I hope you enjoy reading the details within this newsletter.

It is not just whilst in class that our students learn. The co-curricular opportunities, such as above, help our young people to explore leadership and teamwork, to be resilient problem solvers, to support each other, to be supported and to be successful; and we are delighted that the vast majority of our students grasp with both hands all that school has to offer them.

The Government target for school attendance is 95%. Thanks to our pupils and parents/carers, our figures are higher and most Owenians achieve **our** expectation of a minimum of 96% attendance.

Government research shows that pupils with **no absence** are **2.2 times more likely to achieve 5 or more GCSEs** or equivalent, at grades 9-5, including English and mathematics, than pupils missing 10-15% of KS4 sessions.

Punctuality, timekeeping and resilience are all life lessons which your



child will learn during their academic life – please support their learning by encouraging them to leave for school on time and arrive punctually to their lessons.







On 29th March, Owen's ran our annual Careers Fair for all students in Years 9 – 13. The school gym was filled with an exciting and diverse range of organisations, professionals and further and higher education providers. Our aim is that they learn about the rich and exciting range of career possibilities and pathways awaiting them in the future.

The Careers Fair began at 12.45pm with Year 11 visiting over lunchtime, followed by Years 9 and 10 during the course of afternoon lessons. The Sixth Form students were invited to visit at any time that suited them, either during lunch or a free period.

The range of participants provided something to interest all students. Companies represented included HSBC, UBS, AECOM, WSP, SKY and Amazon Prime. Sectors covered included childcare, beauty, sports, construction, healthcare, environment and horticulture and IT. Professions represented included vets, lawyers, engineers, dentists, architects, surveyors, police and the armed services.

## **Eco Committee promotes fair fashion**

The world uses an estimated 80 billion pieces of clothing every year, a 400% increase from two decades ago. This has a massive detriment to the environment as the fashion industry is one of the biggest polluters on the planet – on its own it produces about 10% of annual global carbon emissions. However, it's also one of the easiest for individuals to change. If the number of times an item of clothing is worn were doubled on average, greenhouse gas emissions would be 44% lower.

This is why the school's Eco Committee held the Owen's Fashion Fair on 17 March. This was in pursuit of their target – pupils buying no new clothes in March. When students donated an unwanted item of clothing, they received a token that they could exchange for other donated clothes. In all, almost 200 donations were made, of which almost all found new owners. The remaining will be given to charity shops.

Sasha R, a member of the Owen's Eco Committee, said of the fair, "It was really nice to see people from all the years, especially the younger ones, getting involved in the event. I think everyone was excited to be getting great new clothes but in a more sustainable way."

The extent to which buying new clothes harms the environment is often not realised in contrast to other actions: buying just one white cotton shirt produces the same amount of emissions as driving 35 miles in a car. It seems that people do want to reduce their impact – 75% of consumers believe that sustainability is important and one-third are willing to choose brands that promote environmental and social improvement. The fashion fair has helped the student body to keep their

wardrobes stocked and their consciences clear. The Eco Committee is grateful to all who donated! In the future, the Eco Committee hopes to give attention to supporting biodiversity, reducing waste around the school and to further its efforts in reducing the negative environmental impact of transport. Great help has been received from Ms Knight and Ms Chan, for which we are grateful to them.

# The Library Update

It has been lovely seeing the school library come back to life over the past few months. In addition to welcoming English classes for their regular library lessons, we have been delighted to host Year 7 History classes working on their Castles project, and Year 9s researching life in Nazi Germany. We were also very happy to host a visiting speaker on behalf of the Politics Department: Professor Phil Cowley from Queen Mary University of London came to give a very enjoyable talk to sixth formers about the parliament and politics.

The non-fiction section of the library is being very well used by sixth formers for private study, and students from all years have been visiting both the fiction and non-fiction sections at break and lunch to browse, borrow and return books, complete their homework and enjoy relaxing with a book! We are now open until 5.00 p.m., Monday to Thursday, and 4.30 p.m. on Fridays. So far 120 students have made use of the library after school this term.

We celebrated World Book Day at the start of March by distributing the World Book Day digital book tokens to all students in years 7-11 and by running a 'Best Books Ever' poster trail: 46 members of staff very kindly displayed posters featuring the best book they had ever read for students to spot around the school. The books nominated ranged from children's picture books to academic texts, and included some really great reads. We hope everyone was inspired by their choices – the posters are now on display in the library, along with many of the books themselves, which everyone is welcome to borrow!

The Book Club has been meeting regularly every Wednesday breaktime. This term, students have been enjoying test-reading some proof copies of brand new books, and collaborating to make a display collage of their favourite books. We have just taken delivery of the books that have been shortlisted for the 2023 Carnegie Medal for Writing, and all students are invited to join us for Carnegie Shadowing starting next term (see the Library Google Classroom for details).

Behind the scenes, the library staff have also been busy sorting, tidying and improving students' access to the library stock and ability to use the library independently. We now have a new quick-access catalogue computer at the fiction library desk, a detailed library Dewey subject index; and we are currently designing a new student guide to the library.

We have created book displays to mark Holocaust Memorial Day, British Science Week and Shakespeare Week, as well as to tie in with topical news stories such as the discovery of some new Terry Pratchett stories and some amazing archaeological finds in Egypt. We also enjoyed a visit to the Art Department last week to select some student artwork to be displayed in our space. We're very excited about seeing our choices installed in the library soon!

We are very grateful to our regular student volunteers for their help, both those volunteering as part of their Duke of Edinburgh Award and others who love helping out in the library. We will be officially relaunching our Student Librarian scheme next term – watch out for details on the Library Google Classroom! We also welcome parent volunteers for as much or little time as they are able to give. Please contact the school office for more information.

Our congratulations go to Amira E from Year 11.

At the end of February, Amira participated in the launch of the **Environmental Design Challenge** (EnviroDC) at Imperial College, London, as part of a small team who were awarded a Specialist Subcontractor Award. The other girls in the team were from Henrietta Barnett School.

The competition was organised by the Space Science Engineering & Environmental Foundation (SSE'F) which aims to improve climate change resilience through sustainable development by using the best ideas from multidisciplinary STEMM and business. A total of 78 students from across 6 London schools took part in the challenge.

The EnviroDC brief was to create a vision to regenerate Kroo Bay, Sierra Leone, in an environmentally responsible way that would benefit the local community and attract inward investment through tourism. The judging panel awarded subcontractors to create a joint-venture project for the large complex proposal.

Along with her team, Amira was awarded the *Specialist Subcontractor Award* for their Floating Ecotourism Habitats involving residential huts floating on the surface of the bay. The team were congratulated on 3 main points: their use of the United Nation's sustainable development goals, their expandable green transport technologies and their idea to promote local festivals to boost their tourism.





#### **Chess News**

Chess has been going from strength to strength this term, with lots of students attending the lunchtime club on Wednesdays and Thursdays. In the Monday online national school chess league, our team have been performing consistently well, either finishing first or second most weeks. We are constantly battling with Tiffin School for that top spot!

More importantly though, we have been involved in the National Schools Chess Championships and managed to reach the semi-finals of the regional section. After beating St. Alban's School on board count (3-3), we were drawn against Haberdashers' Aske's Boys' School. This thrilling encounter resulted in our we loss –  $4\frac{1}{2}$  to  $1\frac{1}{2}$  – and alas we were knocked out.

However, we do have one final opportunity in a Repechage Event taking place in May, to get us to the grand finals in Nottingham! Well done again to the team for their hard work and commitment.

In other exciting chess news, Rock Y (Y7), a member of the chess team, has been taking his chess adventures further, with a trip to Ireland to play for the England team in a tournament.























## F1 in Schools Team Inferno Win Judges Choice Award

Congratulations to Year 9 students Ben L, Leo T, Rudraksh Sh, Jaik P, Hari D and Freddie K on winning the *Judges Choice Award* at the recent F1 in Schools regional finals competition at Harlow College. The competition involved the design and manufacture of a model F1 car as per a detailed list of design requirements.

During the competition, the cars, propelled by compressed air capsules, were raced along a 20-metre track to determine the winning car and the quickest individual response times. Teams were also assessed in other categories, including their design portfolios, pit displays, verbal presentations and sponsorship funding.

Team Inferno demonstrated an impressive performance on the day, achieving fourth place out of twelve teams and narrowly missing out on a place at the national final competition.

## A Reflection on the F1 in Schools Competition

As soon as Mr Stensel informed us of this competition, I was in from the very beginning. I quickly put together a team of five others who were also enthusiastic in that area. These people were already friends and people I knew so that made the cooperation and teamwork part of the competition a lot easier.

After I got my team together, we started to divide up the roles and think about what we had to create and present to the judges on the day. The team roles were mainly split in two. The first half was responsible for designing, building, manufacturing and painting our car that we would race against other teams. And the other half of the team was responsible for creating and developing the portfolios, verbal presentation and the overall brand design.

We then spent the next five months modelling, developing, machining and painting our car, as well as finalising our portfolios and practising our verbal presentation.

When the day of the competition finally came, we were all super excited but also nervous about what the judges would think of our work. When we arrived, we were directed to a large workshop area which had everything from CNC machines to industrial sized 3D printers. It really was amazing. We then proceeded to set up our pit display, which is where we showed other teams our brand and car. Then we looked around at the other team's pit displays. There was definitely a very healthy competition! There were many competing schools at the competition, with some schools having entered multiple teams!





We didn't have much time to look around because some of the races had already begun, and many people crowded around to watch. The cars were definitely faster than I had originally thought! We couldn't watch for long though because the judges came by a few minutes later to take our first portfolio along with them for judging. They then came back with our portfolio and to judge our pit display, which we had put a lot of time and effort into, and they definitely seemed to like it. Next, we went along to the designated area where our second portfolio would be judged. This one was about the car and how we made it. The difference when judging this portfolio was that we had to sit down with the judges and explain it to them. They asked us some very complicated questions but thankfully we knew the answers to most of them.

Finally, just after lunch it was time to race our car. I was selected to press the launch button because my reaction times were the fastest. I got very nervous, but our car still performed very well and came 6th overall. There was no time to celebrate though, because the final judging session had arrived. We went into a room separated from the main hall and presented our verbal presentation to two judges. The presentation went very smoothly, and we were out after only 6 minutes. All teams were then told to pack up their stuff and put it in their minibuses because the prize giving was about to begin.

There were many awards up for grabs including: best portfolios, best manufactured car, and many other excellences in certain areas. But the most coveted awards were those that meant you would advance to the next round of the competition.... The national finals. Although unfortunately we did not win one of these, we were only one place off; coming in a close fourth position. But thankfully, we won the judges choice award which was also one of their main prizes. I think this award is meant to signify the best all round team and how our brand's appearance was very good.

Overall, the day and the entire competition was very fun and interesting. I learned many new things over the competition about aerodynamics and how to manage a team across a large project. It is certainly an experience I will never forget. I must also give a huge thank you to Mr Stensel because without his expertise in the machines we had to use, we would no way have been able to complete the project on time.



#### **ECONOMICS NEWS**

We have been lucky enough to host two speakers this term that have enriched the economics curriculum at Owen's. The first speaker was Charlie Robertson who is known as The Time Travelling Economist and you can follow him on Twitter @TTTEconomist. Charlie is an expert on development economics and came in to speak about his book that focuses on the three main issues





that he thinks (given the data) hold back growth – education, fertility and electricity. It was a fascinating talk and at the end of it, students asked some excellent questions about the topic.

The second speaker was Mr Rudd who spoke about life in the city as an economist. Working for Investec, he went through how financial markets worked, the sort of jobs that are available in the city, how shares are valued and the skill set required to make it in the city. Once again, students asked very good questions at the end and took much from the experience.



Some of our students were also lucky enough to attend a talk by Ha-Joon Chang organised by the Economic Research Council, where he was talking about his new book 'Edible Economics'. It is a fascinating read, as are his other books, '23 Things They Don't Tell You About Capitalism', 'Economics: A User's Guide' and 'Bad Samaritans'.



In the drinks beforehand, we were lucky enough to chat to the great man himself and, afterwards, he was happy to sign copies of the books that our students took with them. Henry R also asked a great question at the event... and to be fair to Henry, he always asks great questions!

In other student news, it was fantastic to hear that some of our students went to the Wilberforce Society Conference. The Wilberforce Society is a student-led think-tank at the University of Cambridge and this opportunity was open to all schools.



Here is an account of the day by Archie Ph, who went the conference together with Ari D (photo by Chloe H):

"At 9.30 we turned up and were led to the celebrated Maynard Keynes Hall, where speakers like Stephen Fry had given talks. We listened to a political science and economics PhD student talk about policy making, inflation and governance in a time of conference, all themes concordant with this year's conference theme 'Weathering the Perfect Storm.

We then split into small focus groups. There were three themes you could choose from to discuss. I chose 'Current inflation and the cost of living' and Ari's group was 'Britain: A Science Superpower?'. After the group discussions and lunch, three panels of experts spoke on the aforementioned issues plus one on devolution. Among the experts on the panels were Lord Wilson of Dinton, advisor to Tony Blair and Margaret Thatcher, the Mayor of Cambridge and Vice President of Medicine at Cambridge."

As some of you will know, I record a podcast on Economics with an old colleague from DAOS called Mr Clift. In the most recent Pod Bible Awards (<a href="https://podbiblemag.com/pod-bible-poll-winners-2022-winners-announced/">https://podbiblemag.com/pod-bible-poll-winners-2022-winners-announced/</a>), we came 3<sup>rd</sup> in the independent podcast category.

I'd like to thank all those students who voted for the podcast and if you would like to check it out, then you can on any podcast streaming platform. # **Berlin Trip**

During February half term, 30 GCSE and A Level German students had the opportunity to visit Berlin on a 4-day study trip. In a jam-packed week of activities, visiting everything from historical sites to science museums, we had a great time, learning so much about Berlin's changing faces over its still very recent history.


A few memorable moments included visiting the Brandenburg Gate, having a walking tour of the city and visiting the Reichstag building. Everyone enjoyed immersing themselves in the cultural aspects of Berlin, like shopping in a German supermarket and seeing the *Ampelmänner* (showing us whether we were on the former East or West side of Berlin just by the men on the traffic lights!). A special highlight was visiting the Futurium and the Deutsches Technikmuseum, which helped us to see the possibilities of the future. The Kulturbrauerei museum allowed us to get a glimpse into the East German daily life and culture in the 1950s-80s.

Our hotel was very close to the East Side Gallery, opened in 1990, meaning that we were able to see the artwork on the longest surviving part of the Berlin Wall, which has now become a symbol of peace and unity in the city. We all enjoyed the continental breakfasts in the hotel and spending time with each other throughout the trip.

One aspect of the city that particularly struck us was the way in which it had been rebuilt after both the Second World War and the era of German division. Berlin refuses to hide the marks of its multifacetted past, making it a memorial to all of these various eras (such as through the WW2 bullet holes that remain in the pillars of the *Altes Museum*). The *Berliner Schloss* (Berlin Palace), for example, was damaged during the bombings of World War Two and subsequently demolished by the East German Communist authorities, only to be rebuilt from 2013 to 2020. In order to preserve the building's history, fragments of sculpture from the original *Schloss* have been re-incorporated into the new construction, creating intriguing patchwork sections of stonework.

Other highlights of our walking tour of the Museum Island included taking in Berlin's elaborate cathedral, and seeing contrasting architectural styles from very different eras side by side. The former Reich Bank, for example, constructed while the Nazis were in power and featuring a cold, monotonous facade, now stands next to the modern, glass-dominated building that houses Germany's Federal Foreign Office.

# Year 13 Spanish Trip to Granada, Andalucía

In February, Year 13 students studying A-Level Spanish went on a study trip to Granada. We were given a fantastic opportunity to enhance both our linguistic skills and knowledge of Spain's rich culture, and there were many benefits in relation to the A-Level course as we were able to develop contextual background for the cultural component of the subject.

Our visit to Federico García Lorca's house and the home of the Alba family provided an amazing background for our study of our set text 'La Casa de Bernarda Alba', offering a compelling insight into what life was like in Andalucía during the early 20th Century.







A collective highlight was visiting one of the most famous sites of Islamic architecture: La Alhambra. Its beauty was fascinating: we witnessed remarkable architecture and decoration, and an impressive array of gardens, fountains, and courtyards. All these phenomenal aspects make it an exceptional expression of Moorish and Andalusian culture.







We also had a tour of El Albaicín, the old Moorish quarter of Granada. It has a beautiful location, on a hill facing the Alhambra, and the views were stunning (providing us with amazing photo opportunities!). In 1984 it was declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site and it perfectly captures the Islamic influence in the city.

The facts we learnt from our expert tour guide (one of the teachers from the Spanish school we had lessons in) gave us a detailed understanding of Spain's history, adding depth to our A-Level studies.







There were many opportunities to explore the rich and varied gastronomy of Spain. Some of the most noteworthy dishes included the widely recognised paella, indulgent churros, and some delicious ice cream, courtesy of Miss Brunner and Mr Tanner – ¡muchas gracias!

## A Level Cambridge Course

I'm currently a Year 12 student in the school studying German, Spanish and History A Levels and so far I'm absolutely loving it! I'm always keen to find opportunities with links to my A Levels to put on my personal statement and when I found this course, I knew I had to apply. I found it on my Unifrog recommended page so I would definitely recommend looking at it now and again as I was someone who typically ignored these notifications! I'm also keen to study German and Spanish at university so this course seemed like a perfect option for me. The course was being offered in early February at Trinity College at Cambridge University aimed at Year 12 students keen on MFL, Classics or History across the country with the course lasting from late February to early April. My application was successful as well as around 70 other students across the country sharing the same interest for language as I have with our first webinar on February 28th.

Our first webinar started with introductions to the team running the course as well as an introduction to Trinity College and their degree offers. Though we were all behind screens, the team

were thorough with their information and approachable to information with their Q&A feature on the webinar. Soon after a detailed presentation on the college itself, we started the sample lecture. The first week focused on classics, specifically ancient Rome and its emperors. Dr Lea Niccolai, assistant professor in classics at Trinity College, led a fascinating lecture on Emperor Julian and his speeches with figurative meanings. Our general perception on speeches by emperors is to think they're filled with oppressive language to belittle the power of the people and to build up the power of the emperor yet in Emperor Julian's *Misopogon* (meaning Beard Hater), Julian constantly picks at his appearance and power. Literally, the speech sounds like the emperor is belittling himself through criticisms yet in turn was actually implying his power but we have to read between the lines' to see this.

Our second webinar started with university life but also life in Cambridge as a city too. The information had an underlying theme to balance time between work, sleep and leisure time, something very important they promote at Trinity College and Cambridge University. We also had the opportunity to have a Q&A session with current students at Trinity College and gain a perspective to all aspects they promote whether they be work or leisure opportunities. They had students from Classics, Slavic language and Romantic language backgrounds so many questions could be answered thoroughly and there was no room left for doubt about certain degrees at this point.

We then moved onto the lecture run by Daniel Sutton, research fellow at Peterhouse, who ran another fascinating lecture on Jugurthine Silence. The lecture focused on a book called Salust's *The War Against Jugurtha* and the key focus within the book was how though words can be filled with power, silence can provoke the same or even more amount of power. We were challenged with questions on how power can be conveyed through silence and to help us, we were shown a clip from *The Mandalorian* to see how Boba Fett had power over those he was confronted with. At first I thought it was ironic we were looking at this topic as the course is about power and language but once I heard the lecture, I knew exactly why it was included as part of the course!

Our third webinar started with a presentation on personal statements and specifically what Cambridge were looking for in a personal statement for a successful application. Again, there were opportunities to ask questions in regards to the personal statements yet there weren't many questions as yet again they made things very clear! Our lecture, and possibly my favourite, was run by Dr Carlos Fonseca, Assistant Professor in Postcolonial Latin American Literature and Culture at Trinity College. The lecture was about Wifredo Lam, famous Cuban artist whose goal was to portray his afro-cuban heritage through his art. We were given a detailed biography into his journey from Cuba to Spain to France to Martinique and back to Cuba and how this influenced his artwork but also how individuals affected his artwork, such as Picasso. This lecture was inevitably different to the two before it, not just because the first lectures were classics and this a modern foreign language lecture but we were shown a new medium to demonstrate power.

Lam created profound works with many socio-political messages dedicated to his heritage and power was demonstrated in this way. We were also given the opportunity to ask questions to Dr Carlos Fonseca ourselves. I asked *How come there's little to no Asian influence in Lam's painting although he has Chinese heritage from his father?* and *Do you think it was more important to Lam to explore his heritage in his works or send a socio-political message?* Both questions were asked with an in-depth and personal opinion of someone who had studied Lam's work for years and was therefore very pleased to gain further information on a topic I had fully enjoyed covering.

At this point in time, I am still due to receive a lecture from Professor Emma Widdis, Professor in Russian and Film Studies at Trinity College, about a Slavonic section of the course and much like the three previous lectures, I'm certain to enjoy this one too!

So far I've absolutely loved being part of this course and feel privileged to hear from some of the best people in their field. I would absolutely recommend this course for anyone interested in taking MFL, Classics or History further and have loved my experience of the 'Power, Culture and Language' course.
