



Letter from the Head Hannah Nemko

Although it probably was not the first emotion we experienced when the call from Ofsted came in, we were all relieved that they were coming before the Christmas break as this allowed us to move into the holiday without having to think about inspection. The Senior Leadership Team and the Governing Body

received extensive feedback from the inspectors at the end of the two days of rigorous scrutiny and we look forward to sharing the outcomes with you as soon as we are allowed. Typically, final reports are published within 38 working days of the inspection. Thank you to all students and parents who took the time to complete the surveys and to speak to the inspectors.

The bulk of this newsletter will, once again, showcase the extraordinary number of opportunities afforded to our young people this term. We know that few of these opportunities come cheap and that, with the cost of living crisis and increased energy bills, money can be tight for many of our families. For this reason, I would like to use the rest of this space to remind you all of the benefits of signing up for **Free School Meals** for your young person, if you qualify. (**Spoiler Alert**: the benefits go far further than just an offer of a hot meal each day!)

The obvious bit: Food

If you are in receipt of certain benefits and you sign your child up for Free School Meals (FSM), the council will give the school money for your child to buy food with at school. We supplement the amount provided by the council so that your child can afford the hot 'meal deal' which consists of a main course and a dessert each day although their daily allowance can be spent on any food from the restaurant or takeaway pods that they want.

This money is automatically added to their catering account which means that **no other student** (and in some cases, **not even the student themselves**) **need know where the money has come from.**

Supporting academic progress and wider interests

But Free School Meals are not just about food.

The school receives extra money each year from the government to spend on helping students on FSM, as well as those students who the government deem to be disadvantaged in other ways, progress as quickly as they can. This grant is known as the Pupil Premium Grant and it is proportionate to the number of students on roll who qualify for this status.

The performance of these pupils, as a group, is highlighted in performance tables locally and nationally as the expectation is that this money will be spent in a way which helps this group of students, specifically, advance in their studies and wider learning. Often, Pupil Premium progress can fall behind that of those who are deemed not to be disadvantaged.

The way in which we spend our Pupil Premium money is set out in <u>this guide</u> but it can also go towards certain academic resources for your child, to subsidise curriculum trips or even some music lessons.

And supporting opportunities for the future, beyond school

Finally, to improve social mobility and ensure access for all, there are some universities who are now offering lower grade offers for places on certain courses, or who are simply more likely to offer a place to students if they have ever been in receipt of Free School Meals. Similarly, there are some employers who also look more favourably on recruiting students who the school can confirm have been deemed to have come from a more disadvantaged background.

So even if your child does not want to eat in the school restaurant, they can still benefit hugely by having Free School Meals status. To find out if you are eligible to apply, please go to <u>this site</u> and complete the eligibility form. The school will then be informed of any new additions.

SCHOOL LIFE AND BEYOND

Teaching Internships Programme at Owen's

Last summer, The Advanced Learning Partnership (ALP) offered 11 undergraduate students the opportunity to participate in the Teaching Internships Programme, in partnership with the DfE and Get into Teaching.

These students completed a three-week paid programme, which involved initially observing lessons before advancing to teaching (small group work, starter activities and whole class lessons). They received training on school policies (such as Safeguarding, Professional Interactions and Behaviours, Learning Theory etc), and they also had the opportunity to participate in activities such as sports day and trips, in order to experience wider school life.

We are delighted to be offering this programme once again to undergraduates in any year of study in the following subjects: Maths, Physics, Chemistry, Computing or a Modern Foreign Language. This year, it is also open to those studying for their Master's degree.

The idea of this programme is to encourage those who may be considering a career in teaching to experience life in the classroom. It is an excellent opportunity for undergraduates to obtain valuable work experience for their CVs; candidates do not have to have attended Dame Alice Owen's School to be eligible for this opportunity.

The placements are for three weeks and will take place from Monday 24th June until Friday 12th July 2024. Interns will be paid £300 per week. Applications open in December 2023 and the form can be found on the ALP website: $\underline{www.advancedlearningpartnership.co.uk}$. The closing date is midnight on 31^{st} January 2024.



Internship at The Worshipful Company of Brewers

This summer Brewers' Company members Shepherd Neame Brewery generously hosted a Brewing Internship for Dame Alice Owen's School Alumna, Ibtihaaj Koleoso.

Shepherd Neame's Quality Department hosted Ibtihaaj for 8 weeks between 1 July and 31 August, during her summer break before her second year studying Natural Sciences at Loughborough University.

Ibtihaaj challenged the laboratory team through shadowing and learning analysis and best practices from them. She not only got to spend a few days brewing at the Small Batch Brewery, but she got to create her own recipe and showcase it to the CAMRA members during their annual tour. For a project Ibtihaaj investigated haze stability in Shepherd Neame's beer, this being one of the first things customers look at when deciding if a beer is of good quality or not. Outside of laboratory and brewing work she edited and updated many of the standard operating procedures, conducted hygiene audits around production, and shadowed the engineering team to understand their processes.

This placement brought Ibtihaaj an understanding of brewing laboratories, an introduction to the basics of brewing and practical experience of science in industry. Meanwhile, having Ibtihaaj on board was a great benefit to the Shepherd Neame Production Team and helped the brewery to identify some areas for improvement which they are currently investigating.

The support of Brewers' Company members in providing this sort of invaluable, hands on experience for alumni of our schools is very much appreciated and we look forward to continuing to work with the Brewers, facilitating internships in the future.

Diwali Event 2023

Diwali is a major festival celebrated by millions of people of the Hindu, Sikh and Jain faiths. It's a festival that celebrates the triumph of light over darkness and the start of new beginnings. For Hindus, it's based on the epic tale 'the Ramayana', which details Rama's triumph over the demon Ravana. The festival tends to fall between mid to late October and mid-November, but the exact date varies each year. In 2023, the main date of celebration was on Sunday 12th November. At the school, South Asian Society ran a Diwali event on Tuesday the 14th November, thanks to help from teachers, the lower school and sixth formers.



The Diwali Event was held at lunch in the main hall, and had a food stall selling Bhel puri, made of puffed rice and vegetables, as well as bhajis, samosas and mango milkshakes - all traditional snacks in South Asia.

There were also a range of game stalls linked to the theme of Diwali, such as darts, which mimicked Rama's archery to kill the tenheaded demon Ravana, or 'pin the light on the diya', representing how important the imagery of light is during Diwali.

Cup pong was another popular game involved, in which each of the cups represented a head of the demon Ravana. The event had a great turn out, with lots of competitors trying to win each game. The henna stands were highly popular!

In the lead up to the Diwali event, a rangoli pattern was also set up in the reception area of the school. Rangoli is a colourful pattern inspired by natural forms, made with powders, chalks and sometimes lentils. It's meant to herald the welcome of Lakshmi, the goddess of wealth, prosperity and fortune. Rangoli is highly auspicious, especially in the lead up to Diwali.

To sum up, the Diwali event was great fun this year thanks to all the help from everyone involved, and even managed to raise money for UNICEF, which works in eight countries in South Asia to ensure young people's rights are being met.



The Library Update

It has been another busy half term in the library, with all our usual activities now well underway.

Library lessons have continued for Years 7, 8 and 9. This half term, students have explored the themes of Remembrance, Non-Fiction November, winter reading and festivals through text extracts, class discussion, creative writing and borrowing from themed book displays. We have also welcomed several year 12 and 13 English classes to the library to use our resources for their A-Level research. The Librarian has enjoyed visiting the Science department to hear the presentations prepared by year 7 students following their research visits to the library earlier in the term.

New stock added to the library this half term includes a selection of new books from the *Ultimate Football Heroes* series - we enlisted the help of some expert advisors from years 8 and 9 to help us select books on the most popular players, and the titles have been enthusiastically received by students! We have also started to subscribe to a range of news and leisure magazines for the first time since before lockdown. The titles available now include *The Week, The Week Junior, How It Works, Four Four Two, All About History, All About Space, National Geographic* and *BBC Music.* We have also continued to develop the range of online resources available to our students and staff. Resources available include *JSTOR*, the *Hodder Education A-Level Review* magazines, the *Complete Issues* topical issues database, *New Scientist, History Today* and *Britannica Schools What On Earth!* magazine, amongst others. 

DRAMA

Drama and Theatre Studies

We have had an incredibly busy autumn term visiting the theatre no less than three times to see *The Effect* by Lucy Prebble at The National Theatre with Years 12 & 13, *Pygmalion* by George Bernard Shaw at The Old Vic with Years 10, 1, 12 & 13 and, finally, *The House of Bernarda Alba* by Federico Garcia Lorca with Years 12 & 13.

All three productions will enable our students to have a production to review in their GCSE & A' Level Exams and take inspiration from for their devised pieces.







Our 6th Form students took their Devised Exam in November, producing a hilarious, yet thought-provoking piece entitled *Hooray for Hollywood*, which explored the murder of the film director William Desmond Taylor.

Set in the 1920s, their piece centred round real-life actors who were implicated in his murder, allowing the actors to use a range of research including the 'Hollywood Code of Conduct'. Their piece was performed to Years 10 & 11 during the day and then to parents after school allowing everyone to see the standard of work produced by our most experienced actors.

A week later, our Year 11 students sat their Devised Exam, with three pieces based on an original stimulus of a suitcase. This culminated in three incredibly different pieces ranging from 'What does it mean to be a Man?' that allowed for poignant questioning about whether or not attitudes have changed through the eras as to a man's role in society to 'El Cartel' which was set in a South American country and explored issues related to drug-running in a Telenovela style and and finally 'Forgotten Stories' which was a really moving piece that explored how the victims of natural disasters should be honoured as individuals rather than statistics. Again, our Year 10 actors watched the performances in the day and parents were invited to watch the performances in the evening. Both evenings were very positive experiences for all those involved.



The much-anticipated finale of the autumn term was our production of *Blood Wedding*, written and directed by Ms Govier after Federico Garcia Lorca which took place over three nights in the Main Hall.

The roles of Leonardo Felix and the Bride were played with compelling intensity by Rotimi and Solomia who were very convincing as the couple fleeing the societal pressures that constricted them.

The culmination of their adulterous relationship was defined by the knife-fight between Leonardo and the Bridegroom, which we choreographed together. Both actors were fantastic at developing initial ideas into a really powerful coup de grâce.

There so many strong performances, including that of the Beggar played by Kat whose interaction with the Village Girls often provided comedic yet eerie interludes.



There were three prologues to introduce each of the three Acts which featured the roles of Lorca and his last lover Juan. Zach played the role of Lorca with conviction, demonstrating his strength in the face of adversity opposite Connor. The Chorus of the Disappeared spent lots of rehearsal time perfecting their moves and their use of movement and gesture created an eerie atmosphere.





The opening scene introduced us to the Mother and the Bridegroom played by Anjali and Andrew whose brilliant chemistry demonstrated the high tension caused by the murder of her husband and elder son.

It was clear that the paranoia felt by the mother revolving around knives haunted her as she stalked her son about the stage. Andrew did a particularly great job of showing his frustration, his facial expression, rolling eyes and sighs showing how he wanted to move on from his mother's suffocating hold over him.



Anjali was mesmerising to watch as she quickly moved between abject fear and controlling her son's actions.

Subsequent scenes introduced us to the Bride's family played by Jed as her father and Libbie as her maid.

The transactional agreement between the Mother and the Father was incredibly awkward and it was clear to the audience that Solomia (the Bride) was caught between duty and love. Alone with the ghost of her mother Catalina, played by Iona, suddenly the Bride's feelings were revealed in a really passionate exchange.







The roles of the Bride's cousins were played by Tabitha, Lottie and Hassini who provided a really positive and youthful foil to the Bride's anger and despair.

All three girls were particularly good at surprising the Bride by appearing through her wardrobe and reminding her of the traditional role she was battling against.

In the original play there is only one Neighbour whom the Mother talks to in order to explore her feelings regarding her son's forthcoming marriage and his subsequent demise. In this production this role was split into four roles played by Avin, Simran, Eloise and Isabella. Their use of well-timed pauses and eyecontact made for incredibly amusing moments as they gossiped about the Bride to her potential mother-in-law.





The Felix family causing so much consternation in the play were played by Lottie L as Leonardo's Mother-in-Law, Tiana as the Wife, Rotimi as Leonardo and Agapi as their daughter.

The tension in the household was really raw and was present the moment that Rotimi entered the home. Both Lottie and Tiana did a fantastic job of conveying the underlying tension and distrust that the women felt towards him. This was countered by Agapi who showed the damage that was being done conveyed in the eerie delivery of her dreams about her father's fate.

The Village Girls played by Amber, Lola, Evin, Daisy and Katya were particularly adept at conveying roles younger than themselves in their energy and bright exchanges.

However, they demonstrated that they too were fascinated by the Bride and how she was interfering with the natural order of their world culminating in their atmospheric interaction with the Moon.







The Woodcutters played by Aron, Seth, Francesco, Theo and Zander enabled a sense of camaraderie with the Bridegroom (Andrew).

Their loyalty and attempts to protect him from Leonardo were valiant, culminating in the really powerful moment when they confronted the Father and demanded that he 'Shall not Pass!'

All the dancing in *Blood Wedding* was choreographed by students, Lottie L, Lottie M, Eva & Eloise. The routines created were a mix of traditional Flamenco and contemporary artists in order to demonstrate the way in which the Bride and Leonardo were breaking with tradition. They also created the role of the 'forest' for most of Act 3, creating an eerie atmosphere for the darkest parts of the play.


MATHS

A Level and GCSE trip to the Emmanuel Centre

On Thursday, 7 December, 30 year 11 students went to the Emmanuel Centre for the day on an excursion with the Maths Department. Over the course of 5 hours, we received 6 interactive talks about anything ranging from the real world applications of maths to the ins and outs of exam technique.

The first talk was extremely interesting, given by Dr Colin Wright (Maths Doctorate from Cambridge). We learnt about interesting patterns and sequences such as Pascal's triangle. He also showed us his amazing juggling skills, talking about the advanced mathematical calculations involved in juggling tricks.

Other speakers included:

- Sophie Maclean, a former Quantitative Trader who spoke about intricate design of maths woven into all music.
- Nicole Cozens, a GCSE examiner who demonstrated the process of marking Maths GCSE exam questions, and how to gain the most marks possible on difficult questions.
- Ayliean MacDonald, with a huge social media presence, who experimented with amusing ways to use a chessboard for various creative puzzles and chess variations.
- Dr Tom Crawford, a mathematician at Oxford, with the calculations behind the most intense sporting moments in history, such as the football World Cup Finals and Mo Farah's world record marathon run.



To celebrate German National Day and the Oktoberfest, Mr Robinson and the Restaurant Manager, Jake, organised for the whole school to experience German food in the Restaurant early in the term.






Bratwurst sausages were particularly popular among the students, as were the schnitzels and a number of scrumptious desserts.

In October, Sixth Form students joined together with linguists from across North London to take part in an evening Symposium on Fairy tales, Folklore and Fables at North London Collegiate School. We participated in a number of talks and presentations, including a Key Note on mermaid myths and Mr Robinson's presentation on the Romantic origins of German comics.

German A level students attended the British Film Institute (BFI) in London in November as part of their A level German film studies and were treated to a valuable presentation and workshop on film analysis, followed by a screening of 'Goodbye Lenin!' in the afternoon. Many thanks to Miss Möller for organising the event and Mr Robinson for accompanying the students.



The day after the BFI, Sixth Form Germanists attended an online lecture at school from the LSE on the significance of the 9th of November in the history of Germany. It was fascinating to learn how many momentous events took place on that date! From Napoleon's coup that led to the dissolution of the Holy Roman Empire (1799), to the failed establishment of the German Constitution (1848), to the declaration of the Weimar Republic (1918), Hitler's failed coup (1923), the pogroms (1938) and, eventually, the fall of the Berlin Wall (1989).






In addition, in November, Mr Robinson coordinated the National Language Competition with GCHQ for students in Year 9. 18 students participated in teams of three or four and, although we didn't win on this occasion, two of our teams reached the top 35 teams out of nearly 700 participating schools across the UK. All students received a well-earned certificate for their efforts. Students who took part have also been invited to participate in the GCHQ Christmas challenge in December.

Throughout November and December, Mr Robinson organised a series of lunchtime talks on various careers involving languages, delivered on a voluntary basis by some very kind parents. Topics included Phonetics & Phonology, Creating Conlangs, The Law and LLMs, AI in HMRC, working abroad in Banking and Finance, and the intersection of Music and Linguistics. The talks were well attended by students from all Key Stages and proved to be very popular. In January, a new Linguistics Club will be running, led by Mr Robinson on creating conlangs from scratch.



Throughout this half term, all students have been invited to take part in a German Abstract Art competition led by Mr Robinson. Students have been coming up with a visual representation of the German language in any visual art form they like. Entries are due to be handed in by the end of term and will be judged over the Christmas holiday.



Just before the end of term and straight after our Ofsted visit, Mr Robinson accompanied almost 90 students in Year 7 and Year 8 to Cologne on a trip organised by Mrs Wheatley.

Students had the opportunity to sample the delights of Christmas markets, visit the famous Gothic cathedral, look explore the Lindt chocolate factory and let off steam in the Olympics Museum.

In the middle of Hanukkah week, Mr Robinson organised a dreidel competition and Kosher food tasting to celebrate the occasion.


Window into The World

Our musicians thrilled the audience with their representation in music of the spooky occurrences in a graveyard at Hallowe'en: the twelve chimes of midnight; the devilishly out of tune tuning of the main protagonist, Death, on his violin; and the eerie clatter of the dancers' bones, among many others. As the oboe gave us the cockcrow, signalling the end of the skeleton's party at day-break, the assembly drew to a close, and our brilliant audience of Y7s were sent off to period 1 for a normal day of lessons!



Owen's choirs took to the stage for the first time this academic year in the **Choral Concert** on Monday, 13th November, both the long-accustomed performers of the **Close Harmony Group** and **Senior Chamber Choir** (directed by Ms Makepeace-Lott) as well as some of our new Y7 singers, taking their place on stage for the first time alongside other KS3 singers in the **Junior Choir** and **Junior Chamber Choir** (directed by Ms Sutherland), as well as the self-directed **Barber Shop Quartet** in its new formation.

The concert opened with the Junior Choir in a delightful performance of 'You Can Count On Me' by Bruno Mars. The Barbershop Quartet transported us with their performance of 'As Time Goes By' and we were sent off to the interval with the deeply moving performance of 'Follow the Heron' given by the Senior Chamber Choir ringing in our ears. In the second half, the Close Harmony Group thrilled the audience with their performance of 'Chilli Con Carne' and the Junior Chamber Choir, accompanied by Y13 student, Charlie, evoked the spirit of 'Anastasia' with their performance of 'Once Upon a December'. Featuring seventeen separate ensembles, including the **Cello Ensemble**, **Clarinet Ensemble**, **Guitar Ensemble**, **Oboe Ensemble** (**debut performance!**) and **Saxophone Ensemble**, as well as the **Senior Jazz Combo**, a **Vocal Trio**, the **Drumming Group** and **Junior** and **Senior Percussion Ensembles**, alongside more traditional chamber groups such as the **Brass Ensemble**, the **Y8 String Quartet** and **Les Vents Wind Quintet** the evening gave an extraordinary taste of what Owen's musicians do each week.

We must surely be one of the only schools to be able to boast a (classical) **Contemporary Music Group!** The audience were fascinated by their performance of 'And it comes out here...' by Thomas Herbert, a piece where the final outcome will be partly determined by the performers according to an experimental score (which was displayed on the screen for the audience to see), and will be unique each time it is played.

Keeping to the theme of contemporary compositions, but this time in a different style, the first half of the concert concluded with a performance of Y12 A-level Music student, Sina's, original composition, 'Close Call'. The audience were also thrilled by Y12 harpist, Kait's, performance of Themes from 'Eugene Onegin' by Tchaikovsky, a 10-minute long piece, delightfully performed and all from memory! One of the Brass Ensemble's pieces also gave a first outing to the newly acquired **organ** in the EGH, played by Y13 student, Rufus.

Our thanks to the 10 different musician teachers involved in helping students to prepare their amazing performances.


















'In London Town' was the title given to the Orchestral Concert on 6th December. This was because many of the pieces were by composers working in London across the centuries, from William Boyce in the mid-18th century, to Joseph Haydn, 50 years later, (composing music for the newly empowered London middle class consumers of culture of the Industrial Revolution), to the twentieth century works of Edward Elgar, John Ireland and Peter Warlock.

The **Junior Chamber Strings** opened the concert with their Y12 student conductor, Laura, giving polished and detailed performances. Performing repertoire in its original form (i.e. not arranged for student groups), many of these musicians were taking to the stage for the first time in a DAOS ensemble.

The second half was opened by the massed musicians of the **Second Orchestra** (conducted by Mrs Brady) who delighted their audience with, among other pieces, Highlights from Harry Potter. The **Senior Strings** (conducted by Mr Widden) had sent us off to the interval invigorated by their impassioned performance of Edward Elgar's Introduction and Allegro.

The **DAOS Symphony Orchestra** (conducted by Ms Bamber) closed the concert with a colourful rendition of the title piece of the evening, Edward Elgar's Cockaigne, In London Town, which depicts scenes in Edwardian London.

Part of the orchestra's offering was the **World Première** of a **Clarinet Concerto** composed and conducted by **Y11 student, Matthew**, for another **Y11 student, Hassan**, to perform. Their performance excited the audience to rise to their feet in a standing ovation – a spine tingling moment for everyone in the hall! Following an impassioned speech from the Head, Mrs Nemko, at the end of our two day Ofsted Inspection, the audience were sent off with the promise of reindeer and sleigh bells with the encore, 'Sleigh Ride' by Leroy Anderson.



A stand out performance was given by the **Jazz Collective** (directed by Mr Crossley) at our **Bands Concert** on 13th December. Playing 'Mercy, Mercy, Mercy', an arrangement by Joe Zawinul based on the 1967 live recording by the Cannonball Adderley Quintet, the performance included lots of improvisation, with student TaoHai (Y8) learning the introduction famously spoken by Cannonball Adderley in the original recording. The students continue to flourish in the Jazz Collective Ensemble, learning to play by ear, without any sheet music and working together as a team.

The **Brass Band's** (directed by Mr Kelly) first performance of the year included two tuba players, Matt and Hassan, who had only recently taken up the instrument as part of Mr Kelly's **Tuba Club**. They had been practising hard in their spare time to get up to standard. Well done!

The Junior Ensemble (conducted by Ms Bamber), many of whom were taking to Owen's stage for the first time, opened the concert with a toe-tapping and rousing rendition of 'Rock Around the Clock' eliciting cheers from their audience for the very first item in the concert! Each half was closed by one of Owen's flagship wind band ensembles with the **Second Band** (directed by Mr Crossley) sending us off to the interval with the promise that Santa Claus is Coming to Town, while the **Concert Band** (Mr Kelly) ended the concert sending us off on a second Sleigh Ride of the term, complete with carefully timed party poppers to urge on the reindeer!

Well done to Aditi, Aayushi, Neha and Izzy for their success!




Cross Country
