Our students never cease to amaze me with just what they manage to achieve. On this note, we look forward to welcoming you to our summer play, final concerts and, of course, the Open Arts Evening, on the 6th of June, presenting the art and textiles pieces created by our talented Year 10, 11 and 13 students. The DT department will also be taking this opportunity to showcase the creative work of our skilful Year 10 and 12 cohorts. This promises to be a delectable evening accompanied by music performed by Owen's musicians: our Year 12 musicians, the Guitar Ensemble, the Drumming Group and the Clarinet Ensemble, to name a few.

You may be aware that, in February, the Secretary of State for Education issued some firm guidance for schools regarding the use of mobile phones on site. We have taken time to digest this guidance and to discuss the issues surrounding this change amongst the staff and with other professionals.

Mobile phones and the associated apps afford our young people many positive opportunities both within school and outside. However, increasingly, parents are telling us that their children seem to be unable to be away from their phone for any meaningful amount of time. It is important that young people learn to live, interact and work without the digital crutch that the phone has become and so, we have taken the decision that, from the return to school after this half term break, students in Years 7-11 will not be allowed to use their mobile phones



on school grounds unless they have the express permission of a member of staff.

Students will be allowed to bring a phone with them to school to facilitate their travel and reassure parents and carers during this time, but mobile phones are neither to be seen nor heard on campus between 08:45 and 15:45 without the express supervision and instruction of a member of staff. Students with exceptional circumstances may be permitted to use a mobile phone for specific reasons. The latter will be agreed with a member of the Senior Leadership Team on a case-by-case basis (for example, some of our diabetic students rely on their phones for monitoring their blood sugar levels).

Students who are seen on their phones will have these confiscated until the end of the day. Further sanctions will be in place for repeat offenders. Persistent breaches of the rule may result in a parent/carer having to collect the mobile phone from the school site. This was all explained to your young person at a school assembly. A letter has been sent out to parents and carers to provide more details and information about who to speak to regarding any further questions.

The Duke of Edinburgh Award

As we near the end of the year, students are completing their Bronze and Gold level awards by participating in the final section of the award, the Expedition.

The summer term is the busiest time for expeditions and this half term we have seen a Gold Expedition to The Bannau Brycheiniog (The Brecon Beacons) and a Bronze practice expedition in the local area of Potters Bar and Cuffley.

In April, 17 students ventured to The Bannau Bryeiniog (Brecon Beacons). The Gold students had spent two evenings at school preparing for this and their qualifying expeditions in the Lakes. They had spent time planning meals, routes and learning emergency first aid. On reaching their start point at Newcourt farm, they were greeted by their BXM expedition leaders, who would teach and encourage them during a tough expedition. The experience of the students was varied, with some students having only completed a local expedition of flat terrain, whilst others had experienced many mountain regions of the UK.

Their first night was a little chilly with students waking up to frost on their tents! Fortunately, the night and day time temperatures did improve. Students enjoyed the views from the top of the Black Mountains and beautiful campsite views looking over to the highest peak in South Wales, Pen Y Fan.

Despite some bad blisters and the odd unintentional change in their route, all students did brilliantly, reaching the end in Crickhowell and looking forward to their expedition in the Lake District in July.



In May, students started their journey on the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme. Students have completed at least two of their three sections of the award in order to participate in the expedition. They have volunteered, been participating in physical activities and developed new skills.





As part of the DoE programme, fifty-five Year 10 students completed their two-day training expedition in May. For many students this was the first time to carry packs, plan meals or even read a map. Walking the outskirts of Potters Bar may not seem glamorous or adventurous, yet it provides enough navigation challenges for young explorers. Finding your way out of a field full of rapeseed with no obvious path is not an easy feat!

During the first day the weather was kind and remained dry. However, at 4am, on the second day, students were treated to a storm that made it difficult for anyone to sleep. Fortunately, the rain was not too heavy and had stopped by the time the students got up for their breakfast.





Well done to all that took part and are going on to complete their assessed expedition next term!

In June, 50 more Year 10 Bronze students will be taking on the challenge of their Bronze practice expedition.

Congratulations to all the students that have achieved their award so far this year. Altogether that is 68 Bronze, 34 Silver and 15 Gold! The 15 Gold students will be going to Buckingham Palace to receive their awards this month. Students for the Bronze and Silver should see Miss Lord to collect their certificates as soon as possible.

Well done to all the participants who have completed their awards and I'll look forward to seeing those still working towards their awards successfully complete by the end of the summer term.

GCSE & A Level Exams

Last term was incredibly intense as we had performance exams in March closely followed by the musical, and then the day after the last night I flew out to Jordan with the Religious Studies trip!

Our first set of exams were the GCSEs and our students performed extracts from 'The Hound of the Baskervilles', 'The Secret Diary of Adrian Mole' & 'A View from the Bridge'.



I was incredibly proud of my Year 11 actors as they put their heart and soul into their rehearsals and performed to their parents and the examiner in the evening with real energy and conviction.

The A Level performances began with monologues & duologues from a range of contemporary playwrights including '100 Words for Snow', 'Prima Facie', 'Agnes of God' & 'The Effect' followed by their group piece 'Image of an Unknown Young Woman' by Elinor Cook.

It was a bittersweet evening, as I knew that this was the final time some of our students would be performing at Owen's and I was somewhat in denial that this was the end of an era. Our guests at both exams, including teachers and parents, were really impressed by the ability of our young people and how much they had grown as performers and designers.

The many fantastic leads included 'The Addams Family' itself starring Theo, Lili, Connie, Lola, Sam, Sesadhi & Jack who were brilliant at conveying their somewhat disturbing characters in numbers such as 'Pulled', 'Death is Just Around the Corner' and 'Not Today'.





The leads in the 'normal' Beineke family were played by Iona, Joshua & Aron who blew us away with equally amazing numbers such as 'One Normal Night', 'Full Disclosure '& 'Crazier than You'.

There were some lovely solo turns from Daisy on pointe as 'The Moon', Connor as 'Death' and Lottie L as the external turmoil of Alice's mind!

Our band, led by the incredible Mrs Brady, were as professional as ever. Their efforts were recognised by the audience, who were rewarded them with a standing ovation, as they played us out.

Our Technical Crew and Stage Crew did us proud again, led by Alumni Sam and his brother James who created the gates for the production in their kitchen. Not sure their mum was pleased with that. She, was, however, quite impressed, as were all of us by the end product – an astonishing visual effect, surrounded by haze and glimmering with dramatic lighting to open the show.

Maths Challenge Results

The May Concert

On 2nd May, Owen's musicians finished our spring season of concerts with a wonderful evening of music featuring the **Symphony** and **Chamber Orchestras**, **Senior** and **Senior Chamber Choirs** and **Close Harmony Group** as well as the **Owen's Concert Band**.

This concert was another part of the season where we are beginning to bid "farewell" to our wonderful **Year 13 musicians**. It was certainly a fitting tribute, as no fewer than 30 of them appeared in the range of roles to which we have become so accustomed, being deeply embedded in every item, whether as choir members, orchestra and concert band members, in leadership roles or as soloists. Tara, Cheryl, Eloise and Esther thrilled, moved and impressed the audience as soloists on violin, voice, clarinet and flute in repertoire by Mendelssohn, Handel and Jerome Naulais with the Chamber Orchestra and Concert Band. The audience's excitement was palpable as they rose to their feet in appreciation of the musicians' performance and collaborations. The choral items, complete with their imaginative and creative use of the space and staging, along with the range of ensemble, took the listeners through a myriad of moods and emotions, from being totally captivated, to charmed, to excited among others.





We were also able to enjoy, once again, the sound of the EGH's new organ, generously provided to us on a long-term loan, by the Royal College of Organists, in partnership with Viscount Organs as part of its 'Organs in Schools Programme', in accompaniment to the Senior Chamber Choir's performance of 'O Lorde, the maker of al thing' by John Joubert.

The whole evening was brought to a thrilling close as the final item packed nearly all the performers together on stage, Senior Choir and Symphony Orchestra, with the tandem conductors' double-act of Ms Makepeace-Lott installed in the middle of the auditorium conducting the choir, and Ms Bamber on stage conducting the orchestra, in Borodin's wonderful 'Polovtsian Dances' from his opera 'Prince Igor'.

Then a fantastic fielding display from Izzy and Emily's brilliant 2 wicket maiden over, limited the opposition to 244 runs. The B team showed the strength in depth we have in our Year 7 girls' cricket squads. Eliza batted incredibly well and we set a strong target of 262. Sophie bowled exceptionally, taking 2 wickets and limiting them to 219 runs.

A fantastic first fixture. Well done girls!

Year 8 Girls

Attendance levels at cricket practice for the Year 8 girls have been excellent with nearly 40 girls taking part and looking to improve their skills and knowledge. In their first match both the A and B sides played against Aldenham School in a soft ball format. The A team won by 34 runs with Sienna selected as player of the match, whilst the B team lost by 22 runs. Special mentions for the B team go to Sheneli, who took 3 wickets, and also player of the game Eva. In the second match of the season a mixed side played Katherine Warrington School. Captain Anaya led the way with a player of the game performance and 40 runs but the team ended up losing by 23 runs.

Up next the squad face Queenswood School in the final week of this half term, with matches against Belmont and The Royal Masonic School plus a tournament scheduled for after half term.


Biology Olympiad Success




Tour of CERN

We landed in Geneva the day before our tour of CERN, which gave us the opportunity to explore the city, with many of us visiting the Geneva fountain and the old town, then window shopping in the countless designer shops. We finished the day at an Italian restaurant, where many of us had to refresh our GCSE French translation skills to decrypt the menu.

After an early start at the hotel on Friday, we took the tram to CERN and were taken to a series of exhibitions to start the day. The exhibitions ranged from proton football, quantum tennis - where you can't truly know where the ball 'is'; piloting robotic arm cameras, building your own star, quantum karaoke and even a demonstration of quantum locking, where we saw objects 'levitate'.


We then ate lunch in the infamous CERN canteen where options ranged from Indonesian to German, yet pasta still remained the most popular option.



Our tour guides then ushered us to another part of the site where we learnt in greater detail about the functions of various accelerator technology.

From the radiofrequency cavities used in linear acceleration, to the properties of superconducting materials utilised, and how magnets introduce curvature to the trajectories of the particles.

It was fascinating to learn how the plasma within the accelerator reached temperatures almost 366,000 times hotter than the sun, and yet the magnets had to operate at temperatures of 1.9K (-271C even colder than outer space). Surely the most extreme temperature gradient on the planet!



We discussed the plethora of problems engineers had to overcome when designing and constructing the LHC, and how the technology is constantly evolving and improving, even mitigating resonant effects.

Despite spending a day immersed in some of the most cutting edge technologies on the planet, many of us were still in awe of the Swiss double decker trains.

On behalf of all the physics students, I would like to thank Ms Fradley and Dr Mitchell for taking us on this trip.
