Through this work, which he has continued even after the demise of the AST programme, Mr Cotton has been involved in developing excellence in teaching at all levels, not just at Owen's but throughout the county, including at a number of teacher training institutions. He has helped to ensure generations of excellent sports teachers.

More recently, at Owen's, Mr Cotton has set up the house system, reviving a tradition from the past, bringing a spirit of competition and collaboration to all that we do. It is hard to imagine school without Mr Cotton, he will be missed by so many, but we wish him every success in his promoted position as Assistant Headteacher in his new school where we are sure he will be fabulous.

Whilst finances prohibit us from replacing all those who have left in a like for like manner, we are delighted to welcome Ms Cantillo (MFL), Ms Donato (Physics), Mr Hannah (MFL), Mr Heath and Ms Ibraimi (Lab Tech) and Ms Kocaslan (MFL) as well as Ms Sorrell (joining us in English in January) to our school. I am delighted to say that this means that we are as well staffed as we can afford to be moving into the new year.

All that remains for me to do is to thank my incredible staff for the tireless work they have put into supporting our young people, and each other, this year. We really are very lucky to have such a wonderful team here at Owen's. I must also thank you, the parent body, for your support: it is only when we work together that we can achieve the very best for your young people. Lastly, thank you to all of our incredible students for being the most delightful cohort a teacher could hope to work with.

Wishing you all a restful summer, sending the best of luck to those venturing off to pastures new, to college, employment and university (remember to sign up at Owenians.com so that we can stay in touch) and looking forward to seeing the rest of you, refreshed and ready to go again, in September!

We hope we have some budding teachers in the making!



CAREERS FAIR: On 27th March, Owen's ran our annual Careers Fair for all students in Years 9 – 13. The school gym was filled with an exciting and diverse range of organisations, professionals and further education colleges. Over 30 exhibitors attended from property management, IT and technology, health services and law (4 lawyers from government, in-house, private practice and patent law). Students eagerly interacted with professionals, learning about different careers, educational requirements, and day-to-day responsibilities. Students learnt about the myriads of career opportunities available to them. I would like to thank all our exhibitors for their time and commitment and to all staff who helped in making this event happen.

Empowering Futures in STEM event: On June 5th, Dame Alice Owen's School hosted an engaging after-school event aimed at inspiring students to become the next generation of leaders in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM). This event was organised by a Year 12 student Eniola A with support of the FEM in STEM committee. This two-hour and fifteen-minute event featured an influential keynote speaker, interactive career stalls showcasing diverse STEM professions, and fundraising activities to support a local charity. A key objective was to encourage greater Female Participation in STEM Industries by having a female speaker, alumni Daisy Rabbit, to inspire female students and the involvement of Stemettes, a social enterprise that encourages girls and young women aged 5–25 to pursue STEM careers.



The event received extremely positive feedback from students, teachers. and stall holders. The stall holders, mostly university students currently STEM studying topics, were relatable to the students due to the smaller age gap compared more experienced working adults who attended the general DAOS careers fair.



Window to the World of Work: Students from Years 10-12 have engaged in a variety of experiences of workplaces. Year 10 students were encouraged to spend a day with relatives or friends, giving many the first glimpse into various careers and industries. Year 11 students are supported to take part in longer work placements after their GCSE exams. These placements can help you students to decide whether a certain career path really is for them, supporting them with making post GCSE and Post-18 choices easier at the end of Year 11.

On 1st and 2nd July, Year 12 students visited banks, law firms, dance and football academies, NHS, Rolls Royce and Imperial College laboratories (see photo on the next page). They also engaged in a number of virtual work experiences allowing them to learn about workplaces that are more difficult to visit such as operating theatres, engineering workshops and construction sites.



On 15th May, we had the incredible opportunity to visit the Indian High Commission in Holborn, London. Upon entering, we were given a full tour of the building, and the interior design was particularly striking in my opinion. Think: spotless red carpets, ornate walls, flowers adorning each room, and hundreds of hand-painted, hand-crafted designs in each room. After the tour, we were spoken to by the commissioner himself about the role of a diplomat and what his day-to-day job entails, and this was followed by a reception. Overall, the trip was a memorable and informative experience, especially for those of us interested in the world of politics, diplomacy, and the wider world.



LIBRARY

This term has seen the return of the great *DAOS Library Classics Challenge* to library lessons! To stretch students as they prepare to move up to the next year group, we have invited everyone to read and respond creatively to a more challenging book. Year 7s have enjoyed children's classics, Year 8s have explored some fiction from around the world and Year 9s have tackled adult classics and modern classics. Students have produced some amazing work which will be on display in the English Department on Open Day. The Library team was kept busy preparing challenge book lists, setting up displays and managing the stock to enable three year groups to take on the challenge simultaneously. We hope everyone enjoyed the challenge and will be enthused to try more books from the challenge lists in future - you can find all the lists at the library desk!

We have been very fortunate to be visited by two authors this term. Well-known anti-sexism campaigner and Young Adult author Laura Bates visited to speak to Year 9s about her new novel *Sisters of Sword and Shadow*. Laura spoke about the power of storytelling to change social narratives, shared some shocking statistics about women in public life and gave us a fascinating insight into the research involved in writing a novel, complete with clips of jousting lessons!

Meanwhile, we have been delighted to welcome poet Ash Dickinson back to the Library on two occasions this term, for events hosted by the English Department. Ash was kind enough to run an extra workshop specially for members of our Library Book Club and the school Creative Writing Club, at which he boosted students' confidence in their own creativity and entertained us all with his trademark verbal inventiveness.



We have also hosted a different kind of visit, this time from a travelling book collection! The 'Eurotoolbox' collection of over 80 children's books in a range of European languages is an initiative of the librarians of the different national institutes in the UK and is coordinated by the French Institute. The collection has been travelling around the country all year and is visiting us for June and July. The books are currently on display and available for classes to use in the Fiction Library. Students can choose from books in French, German, Spanish, Italian, Portuguese, Polish and - this year's special guest language – Ukrainian.

Work has continued in the background to update and enhance the Non-Fiction Library resources for teaching and learning. We have collaborated with the Biology, DT, History, PE and RS Departments to select and acquire new stock for these subject areas, and we have also been updating our general reference resources, both print and online. You may like to know that we are now providing *Britannica School* online as a starting point for safe and reliable research at all levels. Students can access this resource via the Library Google page (Student Launchpad > Useful Links > Library) when they are logged into their school account.

We have also bought lots of lovely new fiction books for relaxing holiday reading! The table displays in the Fiction Library currently feature a range of summer reading including bright and cheerful reads, exciting and suspenseful reads and challenging literary reads for our older students. We are also offering a range of brand new science fiction books - classic sci-fi proved to be popular during the Classics Challenge, so we invested in some more modern sci-fi for students to enjoy! Do come and visit us to borrow a great book for the long break, and don't forget to try our summer challenge too!


Puzzle of the Week (POW) is a weekly mathematical problem solving competition for Years 7, 8 and 9.

RELIGIOUS STUDIES

The Religious Studies Department Middle East Adventure to Jordan - Easter 2024

During my time at Owen's dating back to 1996, I have been fortunate to have taken hundreds of students on incredible adventures all over the world. Destinations have included China, Costa Rica, Ecuador & Galapagos, Egypt, Israel, India, Italy, Morocco, Namibia and South Africa etc. Each one of these adventures have provided experiences and memories that will never be forgotten for those students, parents and staff lucky enough to have travelled. Whether it is the stunning Taj Mahal in Agra, the majestic Great Pyramids of Giza and Valley of the Kings and Queens outside Cairo and Luxor, or camping with an incredible array of wildlife including lions and elephants in Namibia's beautiful Etosha National Park etc. these experiences are irreplaceable and students who have long left Owen's still occasionally write to me reflecting on these wonderful trips.

With Tanzania and Zanzibar cancelled due to Covid back in 2021, and with international travel restrictions pretty much lifted since then, I wanted to identify those parts of the world for the next adventure that I felt parents were unlikely to travel to with their children - and at the same time - provide a range of activities and experiences that would prove unforgettable for students. Jordan ticked both these boxes and more. Of course, this trip did not come without considerable serious concerns for both the school and parents. With the awful events unfolding next door in Israel [long after the trip was booked] it later proved both surreal and poignant standing on both Mount Nebo looking over to the 'Promised Land' and the baptismal site of Jesus at Bethany, conscious that tragedy, pain and suffering had (and still is) playing out only miles away.

Nevertheless, having decided on Jordan as the next Religious Studies adventure back in 2023, the task was to put together an 8-day programme for 88 students [numbers were capped] into two separate groups. The first group, led by myself, consisted of Yr11 & Yr13 students taking public exams in the summer along with a handful of Year 10s. The second group, led by Mr Robinson, was made up of Year 10 students only. The itinerary highlights for this adventure were full on but I hope that the snippets below go some way to showing why it is that Jordan should be on your list of places to travel to in the future. From a linguistic, religious, geographical, historical and cultural perspective alone, Jordan has so much to offer and will not disappoint. The student comments further on will reinforce this.

The language

On our arrival, the first thing that struck us was the language. Although many do speak English in Jordan (interestingly, the mother of King Abdullah II is British), the official language is Arabic or more precisely 'Levantine Arabic' since it is also spoken widely in Syria, Lebanon, Israel and Palestine etc. Our first morning was marked by the adhan or an early morning wakeup call from the local mosque. In this case from a muezzin at the King Abdullah Masjid (Mosque) just up the road from our hotel.



This call to prayer (Salat) was the perfect start to the tour and left us in no doubt that we were no longer back in the UK. The more observant students also noted that on the ceiling of their bedroom was an arrow – pointing not to a fire exit - but the direction of the Kabah in Makkah for prayer.



Madaba - The World's Oldest Holy Land Map

It was here, less than an hour from the capital city of Amman, that we saw the oldest Holy Land map in the world. Discovered in 1884, the now-famous Madaba Map is not found on a piece of paper but rather is part of an intricately designed mosaic floor, now part of the Church of St. George. The map was constructed in the second half of the 6th century C.E. and originally depicted the entire Holy Land and neighbouring regions.

To this day, the purpose of Madaba's Holy Land map remains a mystery but scholars agree that the detail and accuracy of the map's geography was the Greek translation of the Bible and on the works of the Jewish historian Flavius Josephus (37-100AD). The map's creators also clearly relied upon their own experience of the land and its geography.

Mount Nebo - Mountain of the Prophet Moses

Having left Madaba, a short 15-minute drive brought us to Mount Nebo which rises 4000 feet above the Dead Sea. This was no ordinary peak and is steeped in religious reverence and historical significance. In the Old Testament Bible, it is referred to as 'a high mountain in Moab' where Moses viewed the Promised Land before his death. It was here that Moses was also buried although the site of his burial remains unknown:

"Then Moses climbed Mount Nebo...There the LORD showed him the whole land...Then the LORD said to him, 'This is the land I promised on oath to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob when I said, "I will give it to your descendants." I have let you see it with your eyes, but you will not cross over into it.' And Moses the servant of the LORD died there in Moab, as the LORD had said. He buried him in Moab, in the valley opposite Beth Peor, but to this day no one knows where his grave is." Deuteronomy 34:1-6

Although the heat made our view hazy, it still provided us with a view of the Dead Sea, Jordan River and the West Bank. On clear days, our guide said that it is even possible to see Jericho and Jerusalem but unfortunately this was not the case for us.





Jerash - The Pompeii of Asia

Less than an hour from Amman, the ancient city of Jerash is for many a close second to Petra on the list of favourite destinations in Jordan. Often referred to as the 'Pompeii of Asia', Jerash dates back more than 6,500 years although its 'golden age' came under Roman rule and the site is now generally acknowledged to be one of the best-preserved Roman provincial towns in the world. Hidden for centuries in sand before being excavated and restored over the past 70 years, Jerash is an incredible example of the grand, formal provincial Roman urbanism that is found throughout the Middle East, comprising paved and colonnaded streets, soaring hilltop temples, grand theatres, spacious public squares and plazas, baths, fountains and city walls pierced by towers and gates.

We spent all morning here and if you do get to go there yourself allow for at least 3 hours (ideally travel there in the morning before the Jordanian heat kicks in – this place is very open to the sun) and bring along with you some cat biscuits. The site has a number of cats which the guides will frequently feed. At the end of the visit, I think it is fair to say that we all left this ancient city amazed with what is undoubtedly and incredible example of Roman engineering and architecture.


Karak - The Crusader Castle

At about the half way point of the tour, we began to make our way south along the impressive Kings Highway. This 150-mile road meanders through mountain towns and villages giving us a sense of the Jordan away from the main tourist sites. This highway showcases many of the important phases of Jordanian history not least at Karak Castle. As a frontier in the battle for souls between Christian and Muslims, you do not need to be military minded to be impressed by this enormous construction.

If you have seen Ridley Scott's 'Kingdom of Heaven', our guide informed us that the castle siege by Saladin in that film was based on his siege of Karak in 1177 following the brutal rule of Reynald of Chatillon against Muslim caravans bound for Makkah. It is recorded that one of his favourite pastimes was to throw prisoners from the castle walls onto the rocks below. If you manage to get to see Karak Castle for yourself, Reynald's cruelty leaves little to the imagination. For the record, having captured Karak Castle Saladin executed Reynald personally.

Petra - 'The Rock/Rose City'

After Karak we eventually arrived at Petra. Rediscovered by the Swiss explorer Jean Louis Burckhardt in 1812 it is not difficult to see why it is without doubt Jordan's most spectacular and treasured attraction. Built by the Arab Nabateans more than 2,000 years ago, the buildings of the city were cut out of the soft sandstone rock. Palaces, temples, the Treasury and various monumental tombs were all carved into the desert rock.



Of course, many people when they think of Petra look back to Harrison Ford's 'Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade' (1989). The merchandise on offer leaves you in no doubt that this was indeed part of a key scene from a major Hollywood picture.

Great as this film was (it is one of my favourite Indiana Jones' movies), this is not really what Petra is all about. That moment you come through the chasm carved into the rock and find yourself in front of the famous 'Treasury' is unforgettable and having seen many of the great world wonders, I do not say this lightly.

Petra on its own is worth a visit to Jordan but if you do go there based on this testimony and those of your children allow for two full days. Petra is a big place and a great opportunity to get fit.

Wadi Rum - 'The Valley of the Moon'

And so we come to another unforgettable part of Jordan – Wadi Rum, which in Arabic means the 'Valley of the Moon'. This is another example of Jordan offering its spectacular scenery to the Hollywood industry. Whether it is David Lean's 'Lawrence of Arabia' (1962), 'Ridley Scott's 'The Martian' (2015) or Denis Villeneuve' 'Dune' (2021 & 2024), it is not difficult to see why this stunning landscape translates so beautifully to film.



Wadi Rum is a valley cut into the sandstone and granite rock in southern Jordan, approximately 4-5 hours' drive from Amman) not far from the border with Saudi Arabia. It is second only to Petra as the main attraction in Jordan and receives less than 3 days' worth of rain a year. It is the ultimate destination for nature lovers and our time there was spent driving through the desert landscape, climbing sand dunes and observing beautiful sunsets. This was another highlight during out time in Jordan and many of us loved not only the aesthetic nature of it all but equally the opportunity to reflect quietly in the stillness of the desert. As a Religious Studies teacher, Wadi Rum helped me to see how it is that many of the great historical religious figures (such as Moses, Muhammad etc.) found God in the solitude of the desert.

Bethany - 'Beyond the Jordan'

"Then Jesus came from the Galilee to the Jordan to be baptised by John." Matthew 3:13 "This took place in Bethany beyond the Jordan, where John was baptising." John 1:28



The name Bethany comes from the Aramaic 'Beit Anniya' which means 'House of the Crossing' and according to archaeologists (after much debate) we found ourselves at the site where John the Baptist preached and Jesus was baptised. The River Jordan has changed its course over the centuries but this place was surreal for two reasons.

Firstly, it is quite extraordinary thinking that even if we were not in exactly the right spot, Jesus would have been familiar and walked this area two thousand years ago.

Secondly, as Jenny Walker puts it in the Lonely Planet: "It's hard for Christian visitors on either side of the water (Israel and the Palestinian territories are literally at arm's length at this point) to pray when watched over by Jewish and Muslim armed guards, intent on making sure you don't cross the border." Nevertheless, Pope John Paul II sanctified this site in 2000.

The Dead Sea

Our Jordanian adventure drew to a close with a visit to the Dead Sea (Arabic 'Al-Baḥr Al-Mayyit') some 1360 feet below sea level. When people say that they have swam in the Dead Sea I think they are not being entirely accurate describing their experience. With a staggering high salt content, it is virtually impossible to swim here. If you try doing the breast stroke you will know what I mean. Just lie back and float. That would be the better choice of word.

The salinity of the Dead Sea is about ten times that of ordinary seawater, creating a unique ecosystem that cannot support marine life, hence the name "Dead Sea." Indeed, the salt concentration can reach up to 34%, compared to a mere 3.5% in the ocean. Fun fact – there is enough salt in the Dead Sea to supply the UK with cooking salt for more than 70,000 years. With temperatures in the mid 30's this proved to be a fitting end to what was a great tour each day packed with culture, history, religion and fun – not to mention the food. Ok, I will be lying if I said that the food was to everyone's liking, but personally, I thought we were spoilt – not least with the lamb, chicken, breads, hummus...



To conclude, going by parent feedback and seeing the students when back at school, Jordan provided wonderful unforgettable and memorable experiences and was a huge success.



Indeed, and I don't often do this following a school trip, but I will be going back there next year with my family. That says it all.

On this note, I cannot overstate how grateful I am for the professionalism and expertise of Dr Ingham who gave up his own time to support Group 1 as our own chief doctor. I don't think many schools do this but for both parents and staff his presence was a pillar of reassurance. I am hoping that he will be up for another adventure in the near future. Until then....



Earlier this term, 131 Year 10 students entered the National Scientific Thinking Challenge designed by academics from six British universities. The students had to look through data, graphs and text to make deductions, spot trends and suggest hypotheses. The challenge therefore relies upon scientific literacy rather than subject knowledge.

This year, the questions focussed on smart phones, hot-air balloons, treating malaria, environmental science and the search for planets beyond our solar system.

Nearly 16,000 students entered nationally with the top 10% being awarded gold certificates, top 25% receiving silver and top 40% bronze.

34 of our students received a gold award, 32 silver and 22 bronze. A special mention to Ben, Hayden and Daniel who all achieved over 90% in the challenge.

We had friendly wins against Haileybury, St Edmunds and Parmiter's School. All fixtures were competitive and the boys have shown great development across the season.


Year 9 Girls
