




Letter from the Head Hannah Nemko

This half term is usually quite sombre. A quiet hush falls over the school as Years 11 and 13 begin their public exams and a nervous excitement about papers and next steps takes hold.

This year has been a little different as the school started gearing up to launch our **50th Anniversary Fundraising Year.**

The new school site, in Potters Bar, was officially opened by Princess Anne in June of 1976 making the academic year 2025-26 our Golden Anniversary Year, which we fully intend to celebrate.



Over this year we hope not just to look back on half a century of excellence, growth and community spirit but we are looking forward, imagining what the next 50 years could look like for our students, our staff, our alumni and the broader Owen's family. In particular, we have a bold ambition: to **raise £1 million** to allow us to build a brand new, state-of-the-art sports hall.

Why a sports hall? Because we know that physical activity is not just about health, more than anything, it's about confidence, teamwork, resilience and opportunity. Right now, we are working within the limits of a space that no longer matches the talent, energy and ambition of our students. A new facility would mean more sports, more inclusion, more





Drama Department: Extended News

Autumn Term: Component 1 – Devised Pieces

Our academic term started off with a bang with the fabulous production of the **Year 13 Devised Piece** which was inspired by the play 'Blood Wedding', leading to our students creating a piece about 'The Disappeared' in Argentina. Andrew, Libbie, Sesadhi, Anna, Iona and Connor created their piece in the style of Artaud and Frantic Assembly, bringing to life the reality of families torn apart by the murder of those who resisted the oppressive regime in Argentina.

This was followed by the **Year 11 Devised Pieces,** exploring themes such as emigration, 'A House without Windows', the cycle of harassment and stalking, 'Scars' and finally a piece exploring the rise of fashion designers from diverse backgrounds making it in the industry 'Not Made By Children'. All our young people were complimented on their performances by their friends, family and peers who came to watch their work in rehearsal or on the evening of their exams.





Winter Term Production: Twelfth Night

The Winter play was a comic delight with undertones of peril as the twins Viola and Sebastian played brilliantly by Sesadhi and Krishan were washed up on less than welcoming shores.

As Orsino, a Brooklyn mobster, Sami was perfectly conflicted by his love for Olivia and the constant rejection that he faces to comedic effect. Unable to force her to love him in the way he can in most of his business ventures, Orsino sends Cesario (Viola) to woo Olivia.

Having a live band enabled our leads to share their passionate feelings for one such iconic moment being 'Fever' with Iona (Olivia) singing about her desire for Viola.

The comedic craziness of Olivia's household who were constantly up for a good time at Olivia's expense provided excellent opportunities for Andrew playing his namesake, Tabitha as Lady Hermione, his mother, and Bella as Olivia's Aunt.

Thrown into this mix was their foil, Malvolio who disapproves of everyone other than Olivia whom he is in love with. Fed up with his demanding ways he is tricked into serenading Olivia with 'Can't take my eyes off you' in Orsino's bar dressed as Marilyn Monroe which Rotimi performed to great acclaim.

This was followed by a hilarious interrogation led by Feste, Maria and Fabian posing as the supposed Dr Topaz and his nurses played by Theo, Emily and Aron. Valentine & Curio (Lloyd & Luca) attempted to protect Orsino while the latter also failed to impress Loretta (Uma) whose wisecracks went over his head to comedic effect. As an undercover PI in an elegant blue number and a glamorous wig, Feste's rendition of 'Blue Moon' was so convincing that the audience genuinely didn't recognise him.

The finale was a reprise of 'Somethin' Stupid' with Sami and Sesadhi leading the whole cast, a perfect end to a romantic comedy.










Spring Term: Live Performances & Workshop

In January the Drama Department went to see *The Tempest* directed by Jamie Lloyd which was an astonishing production particularly in the use of lighting and sound to create an otherworldly setting in space. This was followed by the incredible *'Tess'* in February at the Oxford Playhouse by Ockham's Razor. We really enjoyed this production due to the visually exciting circus-skills performance style and the nuanced relationship between performer, physicality and the text itself. Again, plenty to write about for our students in Years 10 - 13.



Component 2 - GCSE Performance Exams

In March, our students performed in their Component 2 Performance Exams which were marked by a visiting examiner and took place afterschool in our Drama Studio.



GCSE pieces included monologues, duologues and group pieces from 'The Accidental Death of an Anarchist', 'Boys', 'Home, I'm Darling', 'The Watsons, 'The Odd Couple', 'Memory of Water' and 'God of Carnage'.

All were challenging pieces and allowed our students to demonstrate the culmination of two years of learning in terms of acting and design skills.

Component 2 - A Level Performance Exams

Our A Level students performed a week later in duologues from 'Lemons, Lemons, Lemons, Lemons', 'The Wasp' and 'Hangmen'. Their group piece was 'Anna Karenina' by Helen



Edmundson in the style of the theatre practitioner *Shared Experience*, which really lent itself to our performers who are incredibly collaborative in terms of their use of dance, movement and imaginative response to the text.

All the performances were appreciated by their peers in Year 10 & 12 and by their parents who attended their exams in the evening.

Spring Musical: Disney's Beauty and the Beast

Our final performance was our Spring Musical 'Disney's Beauty and the Beast' which I am happy to say was incredibly well received by many members of staff and audience in attendance to support our young people from Years 7 - 13. There were incredible acting, vocal and dance performances and yet again our musicians provided a truly professional accompaniment.



To complement this, there were student presentations and debates. We are very proud of our students, many of whom stepped out of their comfort zone to research a topic beyond the specification including 'A psychological explanation of escapism' by Ben J, 'A psychological explanation of Deja Vu' by Isabella C and 'Juror Bias in Trials' by Esme S and Olivia S. Fabian K deserves a particular mention for his regular attendance and his talk on 'perfectionism' especially considering the fact that he is not even a psychology student.



Additionally, a brilliant team of year 12s Elena S, Emma D, Maisie B and Anisa M devised two 6-week programmes for year 7s to 9s to use their deductive powers to solve mysterious disappearances as part of the ever popular Murder Mystery Club. This involved finger printing, blood splatter analysis and interpreting witness statements as well as other forensic techniques; each week taking students closer to potential suspects and the eventual culprits.

We celebrated Random Acts of Kindness and Valentine's Day with Nikita P and Beatrice R, Josie G and Alexia B, giving an informative assembly to lower school on the biopsychology behind being kind and being in love. It's all about the hormones and neurotransmitters folks!

The Psychology Society events culminated in a mock trial organised by Sophiya L. Here is her review below.

Dame Alice Owen's School held its first-ever student-led mock trial—a landmark event that offered an incredible learning experience for everyone involved. I was proud to help organise it and see it all come together.

The trial took place over two lunchtimes and was open to all Year 12 students. To kick things off, I created a detailed Google Form outlining the various courtroom roles, including responsibilities, required preparation, and how many students each role could accommodate. The roles included prosecution and defence lawyers, witnesses, jury members, bailiffs (played by organisers), a judge (a real legal professional), and a handcuffed defendant in costume to add realism.

Due to high interest, we allocated roles randomly and shared role-specific materials—like witness statements, transcripts, and testimonies—a week in advance to ensure participants could prepare thoroughly. The fictional case was designed to simulate a real Crown Court trial as closely as possible.

We were fortunate to have Solicitor Howard Cohen, who regularly appears in the Old Bailey, serve as our judge. His opening talk offered deep insights into courtroom roles and questioning techniques, and he gave real-time feedback to the student lawyers. After the trial, he stayed to answer questions about his career, which many students found inspiring.

To ensure authenticity, I also consulted another lawyer I had met during work experience, and fellow organiser Kareena and I visited the Old Bailey to observe real trials. We then recreated the courtroom layout in our classroom, complete with a jury box and witness stand.



During the trial, the prosecution and defence teams presented their arguments and examined witnesses. Jury members, selected to reflect diversity, submitted questions via the bailiffs, which the judge read aloud.

After closing statements, the jury deliberated briefly and returned a "not guilty" verdict—matching the real-life outcome of the case.

Our Judge then revealed the actual details, confirming the accuracy of the verdict.

Around 25 students and participated over spectated. We promoted the event through word of mouth, Google Classroom and posters on the common room TV, and it clearly made an impact several students told afterward they were now considering careers in law.



Overall, this mock trial was a tremendous success and a proud moment for the school. I hope it's the first of many student-led trials to come.

A brilliant achievement, well done girls!


