Lots of the utilities infrastructure has already been put into place, plans have been finalised and I am already asking if it is too early to start planning the big opening yet (apparently it is).

Thank you to everyone who came to **The Lashings Cricket day** in July of last year. Through your generosity, we were able to kick start the fundraising year to the tune of £30,000!

There was a wonderful atmosphere in the tent and the game went off beautifully, in spite of the weather trying to give us a run for our money! You can read a full account of the day inside the newsletter but suffice to say that the Owen's team did not really stand a chance against the Lashings stars, not even when they were being nice! We did all have an amazing time however and our young cricketers benefitted massively from the coaching sessions the professionals gave them that morning.

You will have heard about the other fundraising plans in store for throughout this special year. Please keep your eyes out and get involved with as many of these opportunities as you can, many of which only Owen's could possibly provide for you and your children, and help us raise those all-important funds for the school.

Currently, our new staff and students are settling in well and we are delighted to have them all with us. We were equally delighted to meet new Year 12 and Year 7 parents at the recent **Cheese and Wine evening** and to learn that there were several Owenian parents who were excited to now be sending their children to Owen's in turn.

Over 1000 children came to sit the entrance exam on September 1st and more than that number of parents came to participate in one of the school tours which were offered during the first week in September. It is wonderful to see that the school has far from lost its appeal! Indeed, the appeal of the school was most likely further boosted when The Telegraph announced that we were **the most successful non-grammar/state sixth form in the country** and that they felt that we were the ninth most successful sixth form in the country, overall (including all fully selective and independent schools). Congratulations go to Ms McClean and the sixth form team who work tirelessly to ensure the best support and opportunities are available to all those in the sixth form. This was a well-deserved recognition of all that they do.

Indeed, this was not the only award the school has won this year. In October, we were delighted to receive a **Gold Award from the Anti-Bullying Alliance** (ABA). This marked the culmination of a two year process and a huge audit which outlined all that we do to reduce bullying and promote kindness at this school. This was submitted and scrutinised by the ABA as part of the process. Congratulations go to Mrs Blackburn, the student body and the pastoral and the teaching and wider staff body whose work and commitment to our **supportive community*** was recognised through this award.

The outstanding Pastoral Care that our students receive was further recognised by the National Association of Pastoral Care in Education (NAPCE) who, at their Annual Conference this October, announced Mrs Blackburn as their Pastoral Leader of the Year. Our congratulations and thanks go to her for all that she does to support our young people, their families and her teams at school. It was wonderful to see all of her efforts acknowledged through this accolade.

I hope that you enjoy reading about all the wonderful things that Owen's has had to offer you and your young people since our last publication. We also hope that you enjoy the new look and layout of the newsletter. Huge thanks now go to the expanded editorial and creative team of parent volunteers, Claire, Ella, Kiki, Michele and Vicky who are putting this together on behalf of the school.

News from Eco Committee

Eco Committee has been very busy this half term, with teams of students working on numerous sustainability projects, and benefitting from the energy of our new Year 7 members.

One of our big projects this half term was organising the **Sustainability non-uniform day** - we were grateful to all students and families who contributed to this, as well as to Ms Chan, Ms Knight, Ms McClean and all the Year 13s who helped to make it go smoothly. The money raised will make an important contribution towards sustainability projects around the school, including **solar panels** for the new sports hall.



Ms Knight and Ms Chan have also been busy running this year's **Ocean Health Challenge** – with students from a range of year groups meeting every Tuesday lunchtime to plan their entries to this big annual competition organised by UCL. The aim is to use their ingenuity and engineering skills to design a project to reduce ocean plastic pollution. There are generous cash prizes at stake both for the individuals and for the school, as well as the satisfaction of contributing to fight a major source of pollution, so we wish them all every success.



Thank you to everyone who took part in **Walk to School Week** (and to Juliet in Year 13 who oversaw the project this term). It was wonderful to see so many students getting involved - from quick strolls down the road to longer treks from London, every step counted. The October half term sees the end of a very busy D of E expedition season.







D of E Gold

At the end of the summer term 55 Gold students headed into the wilds of the Lake District to complete their Gold assessed expedition. Despite some very wet weather on the first day of the expedition, the students remained positive and determined to complete their challenge.

On the second day they enjoyed a wild camp followed by a superb walk along the ridge to Haystacks. On the last day they walked triumphantly into Keswick to complete their expedition. Well done to all students that took part.

Years 10 and 11 Bronze Assessed Expeditions

This half term has been very busy with expeditions and enrolments. We have completed four weekends of two-day Assessed Bronze Expeditions which have taken place in the local area, enabling over 200 hundred students from Years 10 and 11 to complete the expedition section of their D of E award. This was the final section for many of the students who have now completed their award, enabling them to move on to the next level. Students from Year 10 can now take on Silver, whilst those in Year 11 and 12 can sign up for the Gold Award once they are 16.

Year 9 start their D of E challenge

160 Year 9s have now enrolled to start their Bronze award and on the school INSET day they came in to complete a training day for their expedition taking place next June. Students looked at kit, food, navigation and general camp craft. They are now looking to complete the three other sections of the award over the next 8 months.

The students hopefully enjoyed a day off school on the INSET day on Wednesday 8 October, but for staff it provided an opportunity to improve their practice. All teachers went into another school for the day to observe and ask questions about how their subject is delivered, how the school runs and to focus on their area of Professional Development for the year (there were eight choices including Promoting Literacy, The Use of Al, Oracy, The Transition from KS2 to KS3 amongst others). A wide range of schools were visited, some similar

to DAOS, some very different; staff went into primary schools, secondary schools, 6th form colleges, universities, private schools, state schools, single sex schools, inner city schools, rural schools to see what we can learn from our peers. We all know that DAOS is an excellent school in many ways but having an opportunity to see things done differently in a different environment can help us learn new methods and also reflect on our own practices to try and improve to be even better.



Football

Boys Year 7

The Year 7 teams have all made a fantastic start to school football. Both the A and B teams have put together strong performances in our Saturday fixtures. Our A team progressed to round 3 of the national cup after beating Verulam 5-4 followed by a 15-0 victory against Chiltern Hill Academy. The B team will begin their national cup journey after October half term!

Boys Year 11

The boys have played 3 games so far this year. They played in the county cup and narrowly lost on penalties, but now go into the county plate. They played in the district competition and lost, so now they are out of the competition. In the national cup they narrowly lost 4-3, so now out of that competition. Some of these boys have also been involved in the senior 1st XI team which is a great thing for their development.

With valuable lessons learned from these cup matches, the focus now turns to the District League, where the girls still have plenty to play for. Upcoming fixtures against Broxbourne, Beaumont, and Haileybury will offer further opportunities for the team to showcase their development, teamwork, and competitive spirit as they look to finish the season on a high.




Library catalogue new home page

New Library Catalogue System Launched


Students and staff can now enjoy much easier access to information about library books and services and to their own library accounts thanks to our new library catalogue system, **Accessit**. Accessit is specially designed for school libraries.

Here are just a few of the benefits our library users can now enjoy:

- No more usernames and passwords: Accessit works with Google Single Sign-On, meaning that once they are logged into their school accounts, students can click straight through from the Student Launchpad to their own library accounts.
- No need to use a library card to borrow books from the library: students just need to give their names for us to look them up on the system. We have now phased out the distribution of new plastic library cards for environmental reasons. However, existing library cards do still work with the system, if students prefer to continue using them.
- Attractive and user-friendly interface including book jacket images, detailed information about each book, clear availability information and options to reserve or like items or write reviews.
- Online reading lists and themed dashboards to encourage students to explore topics in greater depth within a safe online environment. We will be adding new reading lists and dashboards to our system throughout the year – keep checking back for more!
- A range of search functions including simple and advanced searches and a 'One Search' option to simultaneously search the library stock and a range of online resources, including our

subscription databases – ideal for homework and sixth form research projects.

- Regular library loan reminder emails directly to students' school accounts featuring images of the books to be returned to help jog memories!
- A dedicated student librarian account on the system, so our wonderful team of helpers can now check books in and out at the desk professionally.
- And our top tip: try logging in on your birthday for a special greeting!

Students can access the library catalogue, including their own library accounts, via the Student Launchpad or from the dropdown quick link on the school website (if logged into their school Google Account).

There is also a catalogue computer at the desk in each room of the library for quick catalogue searching as a guest user. The introductory video embedded in the catalogue home page provides a very helpful overview of the system; parents and carers are encouraged to watch this with their young people.
